Fellow Redeemed,

I would like to take this opportunity, during this Lenten season, to draw our focus to the Ten Commandments. They are a gift from God. I can only say that within the context of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Without Jesus, the Ten Commandments are a curse to me, a lost and condemned creature. But, the Gospel of

God is this: Jesus Christ, God's Son, has fulfilled these commandments for me, and empowers me through the Holy Spirit to now keep them.

"As the head of the family should teach them in a simple way to his household". -Martin Luther, Small Catechism

The First Commandment. You shall have no other gods. What does this mean? We should fear, love and trust in God above all things.

The Second Commandment. You shall not misuse the name of the Lord your God. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not curse, swear, use satanic arts, lie, or deceive by His name, but call upon it in every trouble, pray, praise, and give thanks.

The Third Commandment. Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not despise preaching and His Word, but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it.

The Fourth Commandment. Honor your father and your mother. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not despise or anger our parents and other authorities, but honor them, serve and obey them, love and cherish them.

The Fifth Commandment. You shall not murder. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt or harm our neighbor in his body, but help and support him in every physical need.

The Sixth Commandment. You shall not commit adultery. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we lead a sexually pure and decent life in what we say and do, and husband and wife love and honor each other.

The Seventh Commandment. You shall not steal. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not take our neighbor's money or possessions, or get them in any dishonest way, but help him to improve and protect his possessions and income.

The Eighth Commandment. You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way.

The Ninth Commandment. You shall not covet your neighbor's house. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not scheme to get our neighbor's inheritance or house, or get it in a way which only appears right, but help and be of service to him in keeping it.

The Tenth Commandment. You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or his manservant or maidservant, his ox or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not entice or force away our neighbor's wife, workers, or animals, or turn them against him, but urge them to stay and do their duty.

These commandments of God are a blessing to us through the Gospel of Jesus, who has kept them perfectly on our behalf. By the power of God through the Holy Spirit, God enables us, through faith to now keep them. When we fall short, God is there to forgive and bring us, through repentance, back to Himself by His Word. May this Lenten season continue to be a blessing from God through the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Amen.



I expect most of us agree that communication is important – at work, with our friends, with our families and certainly with our spouses. That is how we learn about each other and understand important aspects of each relationship. And I suspect that if you are like me,

there are times when poor communication or especially lack of communication can conjure up all kinds of problems due to not "knowing" and not "understanding." When a situation of that nature has occurred, we plan and hope to improve our communication skills for a positive outcome.

Do you remember a time when things didn't go as expected or you prayed for something and you didn't get it? Or in fact, your situation got worse and worse? I think about Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane, praying to his Father (Mark 14:36 ff.), to "remove this cup from me." Jesus also prayed, "Yet not what I will, but what you will." Now if the Father had said to Jesus, "OK. You don't have to go through this. These people will always go their own way anyway", we would be dead in our sins and would have no hope for eternal life in heaven. We could say that Jesus didn't get his way because he did suffer and die a horrendous death. But that would not be correct. Jesus got his way. The Father didn't remove the horrible way Jesus would suffer and die, but He helped Jesus get through what needed to be done. He saved the world as was planned from eternity. He and the Father are one. In John 12:47, Jesus said that he did not come to judge the world but to save the world. And please continue reading in verse 49 about communication from the Father to the Son and to us who hear and read his Word.



It is a true joy to break away from homework for a moment to send a letter home to our friends and family in Christ. This has been the most intense, most demanding stretch of our Seminary journey so far. The academic demands seem to have doubled. Expectations and work load are higher than ever before. Add to this the required paperwork, vicarage training sessions, and field work obligations and many of my classmates feel like we're running on fumes. Please pray for our continued renewal in the Lord as we seek to serve Him and His people.

Suzy maintains a busy schedule, seeing children both at home and at school for speech therapy. She has begun to wonder where she'll need to get her next therapy license. So far, she has been licensed in Kansas, Oklahoma and Missouri, and we may need to add another state to that list when we head out on vicarage this summer. The vicarage placement director says he has a good idea where we'll end up, although he is keeping the details to himself.

To be eligible for a vicarage placement, students have to have completed a majority of their coursework, have a strong GPA, delivered at least 2 sermons, and attended a series of previcarage seminars. They're on a variety of topics like personal finance, sexual harassment, and building relationships. There are two more seminars this month, one on youth ministry and one on social skills. The LWML is providing dinner to all prospective vicars and their families before one of the meetings and National LWML President Patti Ross will be there as a guest speaker. While all the other students will be starstruck, it will be nice for Suzy and me to see a familiar face from home.

Patti's visit to the Seminary actually happens over our Spring Break. Since we won't be traveling, I signed up to preach at our fieldwork congregation's midweek Lenten services that Wednesday. Our church is doing a series on characters from Jesus' passion, including Peter, Judas, Pilate and Herod. I am preaching on Barabbas. They always do two services, one in the evening and the other in the morning. It's another opportunity to worship if the evening service is inconvenient or they don't want to drive after dark. The daytime service has another advantage: the students from the Lutheran grade school at our church attend. It will be a unique challenge to preach at a service that's mostly full of schoolchildren, but I am looking forward to it.

Throughout Lent, many in St. Louis are participating in a program called 40 Days for Life. Different churches and ministries – Lutheran, Roman Catholic and others – are committing to pray outside Planned Parenthood locations each day until Easter. We're not there to protest or offer our opinions. We simply stand and pray, asking that our Father would intervene on behalf of the lives of the unborn. I will be going twice, once with the Seminary and once with Suzy and others from our field work church. We will be taking Graham along, too. Suzy and I feel strongly about the sanctity of life, not just before birth, but throughout our lifetimes. As God's people, it is important to care for those whose lives are threatened by abortion, disease, hunger, depression, exploitation, neglect, and euthanasia. Because we are firmly pro-life, we pray for the baby in the womb, the student in the classroom, the patient with mental illness and the convict in prison. All lives are precious to our Father and no one lies beyond the reach of His love and forgiveness.

Obligatory baby update: Graham is 9-months-old and weighs more than 20 pounds. He is growing like crazy. He got his first ashes this year during Ash Wednesday services. Graham still loves music and playing the piano. He also loves puppets. I mean, he LOVES puppets. Suzy has a hippopotamus puppet she bought at Concordia Publishing House. The hippo's name is Humphrey and he speaks with a British accent. Graham's eyes light up when Humphrey shows up. Suzy also takes Graham to the local library in Richmond Heights, where along with books, the children's library has a collection of puppets to play with. It's his new favorite place.

He hasn't seemed all that interested in crawling, but he loves standing up. He pulls up on the furniture and cruises from one thing to another. Occasionally, if you're helping him stand, he'll let go of your hands to see if he can do it all by himself. (So far, that hasn't gone well.) Graham went through a phase of being pretty attached to Mom and Dad, but has recently started doing well with new people again. And our little boy has begun sleeping through the night, and didn't need any coaxing from his parents to do so. Graham has continued his trend of taking it easy on his parents.

When Suzy isn't taking care of Graham or her students, she's often taking care of her stressed-out husband. As I mentioned before the increasing pressure of the Seminary program has been weighing heavily on me. As a sheer coincidence, I am enrolled this semester in a course on counseling fundamentals. Classmates and I are studying the bare basics of therapy and counseling, and we practice our burgeoning skills on one another. It is always good to know that your Christian brothers are there to listen and encourage when you're feeling burnt out.

One of the activities in the counseling class is an exercise in listening. Many of us are used to making conversation and filling in silences with small talk, but this counseling course wants us to be sure we haven't forgotten how to listen. In our listening exercise, the professor paired us up with a classmate and invited students from a different seminary to observe and evaluate us. The other students are all studying to become licensed Christian counselors at Covenant Seminary here in St. Louis. It has been good to get their insight, since they have had years worth of counseling courses, and we will only have this one class.

As always, I cannot overstate how meaningful it is to know you're standing by us, supporting us with your gifts and prayers even in stressful seasons. Know that we hold you deep in our hearts and your kindness means so much.



When and where is the next gathering?

The next LCMS Youth Gathering will be July 11-15, 2019 in Minneapolis, MN.

Who can attend?

The LCMS Youth Gathering's primary focus is for youth participants between the ages of 14 to 19. To register for the 2019 Gathering, youth participants must meet ONE of the two following eligibility requirements:

– Must be 14 years old at the time of the Gathering (July 2019)

OR

- Entering his or her ninth grade year at the time of the Gathering. (August 2019)

While we do allow students from the ages of 14 to 20 to attend, please keep in mind that some of the program content may not be relevant to older youth participants.


Who can chaperone?

Participants who are 21 years or older by the time of the Gathering are able to attend the Gathering as an Adult Leader. Registration for the 2019 Gathering will begin in the fall of 2018. After registration the remainder of the cost will be fundraised. Any money not fundraised by the time of the Gathering will be the responsibility of the participant.

Thank You Betsy and my Brother's and Sister's in Christ at CTR! Rufus and I thoroughly enjoyed our visit this past weekend... As Betsy mentioned, multiple Lutheran Church Charities Comfort Dogs and Handler Teams have been deployed to Parkland, FL in response to the tragic school shooting just yesterday. As a matter of fact, this will be a return trip for some of these humans and K9s as some of them answered the call to comfort victims of the Orlando nightclub shooting as well.






