Oklahoma District Celebrates 90 Years, Sets New Mission Goal, Elects Leaders

Under the theme "Great Is Thy Faithfulness," the LWML Oklahoma District convened in Lawton to celebrate 90 years of mission service in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to vote on new mission grants for the biennium 2018-2020, and to elect new members to the Board of Directors.

Attendees arriving Friday morning participated in servant activities that included tying blankets, marking Bibles, making witness bracelets, and decorating memory boxes. District young women bagged popcorn to be given to attendees as they left on

Saturday. Following a morning of these activities, as well as the opportunity to browse the many exhibits on hand, the convention began. Friday business included adoption of the \$104,600 biennium mission goal, presentation of the proposed mission grants, and voting on those grants. Ms. Cindy Steinbeck, Bible study author and owner of Steinbeck Vineyards and Winery, led the Bible study. Past LWML Presidents Linda Reiser and Virginia Von Seggern addressed the assembly. The first day of convention ended with a joy-filled worship service at St. John's, Lawton.

Saturday business included announcing the results of mission grant balloting, voting on officers, and participating in additional Bible study and interest sessions. Mission Speaker Rev. Dr. Brent Smith informed the assembly on the purpose of Mission Central, that is to support missionaries serving around the world. As part of the celebration of 90 years, descendants related to the founders of Lutheran Women's League (as it was first called) were invited forward and introduced to the assembly. The convention's closing worship service ended with "Sent Forth by God's Blessing," and attendees once again entered the mission field that is the Oklahoma District refreshed and renewed to follow God's plan for the LWML.

Jesus is the Secret!

I can do all things through him who strengthens me (Philippians 4:13).

Greetings in Christ our Risen Lord. I am honored to be selected as a pastoral counselor for the LWML Oklahoma District. I have a history with this organization that I'd like to share. I want to tell you about a real Lutheran Woman in a League of her own. She's my Nana. This woman taught me so much about real faith. She taught me a lesson that the Concordia University—Wisconsin and Concordia Theological Seminary never could. You see, at these fine institutions I learned how to read and translate the words of Philippians 4:13, but Nana showed me how to live them. At the end of nearly every email that I ever got from her, at the end of every letter, at the end of almost every birthday, Christmas or Easter card, she signed, "Nana, Phil. 4:13." Here's one for your consideration.

Hi, a plea for prayer (for me).

After 4 or 5 days of increasing pain I finally gave up about 5:00 this morning, and we went to the E.R. This time we got there under our own power, or that of the Taurus, but no sirens or flashing red lights. After x-rays and blood tests, etc. there is nothing to worry about, just go ahead and hurt. Dr. Richardson did change the med to Percocet to last until Monday when I have an

appointment with Dr. Baade, and we shall see what happens then. He did suggest Fentanyl patches, and it does seem to me that we went that way once with results not so great, but we'll see. What a pain in the posterior, guess that is both literal and figurative. I do feel some better, but both of us are exhausted. Dad is asleep on the bed, and I had a short nap while he went to get the meds, and we shall see what happens from here on. I promise to live to give you all a hard time for a long time. I just really wish it weren't so hard on your Dad.

Maybe chat with you all later. Love you all a big bunch, honest. Nana, Phil.4:13

This woman didn't say it lightly. The pain she was talking about was the result of many back surgeries. The pain had been so great in her last years that she had to go to Missouri to get the prescription filled because lowa wouldn't give her a high enough dose in her pain pump to be of any effect. This woman had been through the stillbirth of a child. In the last 5 years of her life, she was diagnosed with dementia. This woman who taught me most of what I know about grammar and language, who taught me my love of literature and had always been incredibly sharp, was having a hard time remembering our conversations. She had a brain tumor removed only to find that she also had breast cancer and had to go through surgery for that. And yet, "Nana, Phil. 4:13."

This woman showed me the meaning of that passage. It's not about the cool stuff you can do. It's not about getting everything you want or being able to do anything. It's about your source of strength. It's about knowing that you've got Jesus Christ and that's really all you need. As of this writing, it's been about 11 months since this wonderful and formative example of faith was called home to be with her Lord. She finished her race all the while trusting in the source of her strength that is Christ Jesus. I encourage you all in your efforts to remember that in all things Christ gives you all you need to accomplish the will of our Heavenly Father.

- 2) Keep your favorites on your desk and reread while waiting for your computer to reboot.
- 3) Keep a few handy for when you are placed on hold on the phone.
- 4) Use them as bookmarks in your library books.
- 5) Leave the bookmarks inside the books when you return them to the library.

Recycling is Alive and Well in the Oklahoma District

Here's a question to ask at your next society meeting: "Are we recycling?" Our district has actively recycled printer cartridges, cell phones, and other electronic devices since 2001. Began primarily to pay expenses for the 2003 LWML Convention held in Oklahoma City, the Recycling Fund has raised over \$81,000 through the years. Funds are dispersed in the following way:

- 25% of the funds go to national LWML Mites,
- 10% to the Oklahoma District Special Gifts Fund, and
- 65% to help with leader training expenses.

Significant changes to the program have occurred since January of this year, and it behooves each society to locate the list of qualifying items provided at oklwml.org. From the home page, click on the left sidebar where you see "New Recycling Update." Read about the program and its history. Find links to various qualifying lists and flyers. Print and distribute the flyers and lists to members of your society and congregation. Note that shipping guidelines have changed, and that a box of items needs to weigh between 20 to 40 pounds before shipping. When a society has a box of this weight, a representative of the group should contact Marguerite Christman, Recycling Manager, at MChrist721@aol.com. She will send via mail a prepaid shipping label to be used on the box. Societies who have been recycling should note that if they received their shipping labels prior to January of this year, then these labels must be destroyed and new ones acquired from Marguerite.

Recycling efforts have raised funds to assist with expenses in our district, allowed us to contribute to national mission grants, and provided a way for us to care for God's creation by keeping these items from landfills. All societies are encouraged to continue, or in some cases begin, these efforts. Go to oklwml.org for all the information or contact Marguerite Christman for more details.

As we celebrated 90 years of service, in keeping with this longstanding tradition, one of our district convention servant activities was tying lap blankets for the Veterans Administration Center in Lawton.

Last year while preparing for the servant activity, It was difficult to decide which 25 or 30 veterans
