Fellow Redeemed,

We are in the midst of our capital campaign, *For Future Generations*. Christ the Redeemer Lutheran Church is a vibrant congregation that dates back to 1954. For over 60 years, our church has ministered the Gospel to our community, country, and the world. While facilities and faces have changed over the years, one thing remains the same...our commitment to the power of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

The biggest need in our church today is space and room to grow. We have been incredibly blessed to have continued growth and increased use of our space. Our church building has had two expansions thus far – one in the mid-1980s and one in the mid-1990s. Since that time, key ministries like VBS, Youth and Family, and our ECC are at (or past!) the maximum limit for their service because of facility space constraints. In addition, storage is a challenge all around the building. This affects how we present ourselves as a congregation for visitors, but also makes it difficult to keep staff and volunteers organized. Some people have reported to keeping things at their homes because there simply is not enough storage space in the building. Many items are being stored in hallways, which is not safe.

Our renovation plans will increase our total space from 28,514 square feet to 40,372 square feet. The resulting space will not only alleviate the current space challenges, it sets our congregation up to continue our growth in ministry and mission. In addition, our plans include significant amounts of new storage which will eliminate the clutter; no longer will we have boxes or strollers in the hallways. Members will no longer feel obligated to store items at home.

In order to address our needs and plans we are initiating an intensive effort to raise funds for this expansion. Our goal is to raise the full \$4,500,000, which will enable us to complete the project debt free.

In preparation for this important effort, I am asking for your help in three important ways.

First, please pray for God's will through this process. We can accomplish nothing, in and of ourselves...God will accomplish all and will receive all honor and glory.

Second, please prayerfully consider lending a hand and becoming a campaign volunteer. Over 40 individuals and/or couples are needed to assist with the campaign in a variety of ways, to assure that the effort is efficiently run and that the job of volunteering is easy and enjoyable for everyone.

And finally, you will all eventually be asked to support the campaign effort financially. Long-term subscriptions or pledges are payable over a minimum of three years, and are made over and above whatever you do regularly for our church, in order that we do not jeopardize our regular giving and in any way erode our ability to provide support for current ministries.

Through the prayerful, volunteer and financial support of us all, I am confident that we will succeed in our task. Consequently, I am also confident that our past as a church community will only be a prologue to an even more promising and prosperous future filled with an improved willingness and empowerment by God to do His will and work. May God the Father, who created us, and God the Son, who has redeemed us, and God the Holy Spirit, who sanctifies us, continue to lead us according to His will. Amen.

Special Speaker, Rev. Dale Kaster
Missionary in Prague, Czech Republic

Rev. Dale and Suzanne Kaster serve the Lord as career missionaries through The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod in Prague, Czech Republic. In this role, Dale trains men from the country to serve as pastors of the Lutheran Evangelical Church of the Augsburg Confession in the Czech Republic (ECAVvCR). He will also serve as the pastor of an English language Lutheran Church in Prague, which serves our OIM Eurasia office staff and many English-speaking expats living in Prague. In addition to this, Pastor Kaster will assist in the regional chaplaincy position for those missionaries working in Silesia, Czech Republic. Through the relationships that are formed, Dale and Suzanne seek to share the Good News of Jesus Christ with the people of the Czech Republic.

Dale was born in Stephenville, Newfoundland, Canada. His home congregation is Celebration Lutheran Church, Jacksonville, Florida. He graduated from Concordia College, Bronxville, New York, with a bachelor's degree in Judeo-Christian Heritage. He received his Master of Divinity from Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Missouri. Before becoming a career missionary, Dale served as a pastor at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, Point Pleasant, New Jersey (1989-1994); Celebration Lutheran Church, Jacksonville, Florida. (1994-2010); Martin Luther Chapel, Pennsauken, New Jersey (2010-2013). Before serving in Prague, Dale was Theological Educator/Missionary-at-Large in Tamale, Ghana (2014-2018). He also served on short-term mission trips to the Ntshongweni Village in South Africa (2007-2011). Dale's hobbies include cooking, skeet shooting, reading, and Civil War history.

Suzanne was born in LaGrange, Illinois, and her home congregation is also Celebration Lutheran Church, Jacksonville, Florida. She attended Concordia College, River Forest, Illinois. Suzanne's hobbies include cross-stitching, reading, and working on genealogy. Please, pray for Dale and Suzanne as they serve in Prague, Czech Republic.

Please ask God to daily give Dale the strength and knowledge as he mentors men for the ministry and serves the congregation in Prague. Pray that the Holy Spirit leads and guides him as he serves in the chaplaincy. Please also pray for the men who receive Dale's instruction that their hearts and minds are open to what God wants them to learn. Ask God to help each student to grow to become faithful and compassionate under-shepherds serving His flock. In addition, please pray for all people of the Czech Republic who will learn of the Good News of Jesus Christ through the missionary work that is being done in this country.

A Message from Take H.E.A.R.T. What is the difference between Alzheimer's and typical age-related changes?

Early Signs and Symptoms of Alzheimer's-Memory loss that disrupts daily life may be a symptom of Alzheimer's or other dementia. Alzheimer's is a brain disease that causes a slow decline in memory, thinking and reasoning skills. There are 10 warning signs and symptoms. If you notice any of them,

don't ignore them. Schedule an appointment with your doctor.

1-Memory loss that disrupts daily life
What's a typical age-related change? Sometimes forgetting names or appointments, but remembering them later.

2-Challenges in planning or solving problems
What's a typical age-related change? Making occasional errors when balancing a checkbook.

3-Difficulty completing familiar tasks at home, at work or at leisure.
What's a typical age-related change? Occasionally needing help to use the settings on a microwave or to record a television show.

4-Confusion with time or place.
What's a typical age-related change? Getting confused about the day of the week but figuring it out later.

5-Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships.
What's a typical age-related change? Vision changes related to cataracts.

What to do if you notice these signs-If you notice any of the 10 Warning Signs of Alzheimer's in yourself or someone you know, don't ignore them. Schedule an appointment with your doctor. With early detection, you can explore treatments that may provide some relief of symptoms and help you maintain a level of independence longer.



6-New problems with words in speaking or writing
What's a typical age-related change? Sometimes having trouble finding the right word.

7-Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps.
What's a typical age-related change? Misplacing things from time to time and retracing steps to find them.

8-Decreased or poor judgment
What's a typical age-related change? Making a bad decision once in a while.

9-Withdrawal from work or social activities
What's a typical age-related change? Sometimes feeling weary of work, family and social obligations.

10-Changes in mood and personality
What's a typical age-related change? Developing very specific ways of doing things and becoming irritable when a routine is disrupted.

Grandparents Day

A Legacy of Faith...

National Grandparents Day became an official observance in 1978, thanks largely to the lobbying efforts of Marian McQuade, a West Virginian who had 15 children and 43 grandchildren during 60 years of marriage.

The purpose of National Grandparents Day, celebrated on the first Sunday after Labor Day, is threefold: to honor grandparents, to give grandparents an opportunity to show love for their children's children and to help children become aware of strength, information and guidance older people can offer.

Grandparents - and, in the mobile society, surrogate grandparents - also serve as examples of how to endure challenges with God's help. Elders describe how God remains present, faithful and steadfast throughout the years. As Psalm 145:5 (NIV) says, "One generation commends your works to another; they tell of your mighty acts."

Seniors Solve Problem

(taken from *The Village Voice* by: Ken Eggers)

In preparation for retirement, my wife Dot and I, along with our two RVing friends, purchased lots, side by side, near the little town of Hemet, California. Hemet is located on the west side of Mount San Jacinto while Palm Springs is in the desert on the east side. We called Hemet "Poor Man's Palm Springs".

A year before we all retired, we purchased manufactured houses and had them placed on our lots. Knowing we would be traveling at least four months each summer, all three of us landscaped our yards with gravel, boulders and driftwood. We also took into consideration the high cost of water in Southern California. Most of the water came from Northern California and the Colorado River. In addition to our three houses, there were only 10 others so far in our development which was for seniors only.

When we finally retired, we sold our homes in Orange County and moved into our houses in Hemet. While the three of us had inorganic landscaping, the other residents had lush green lawns (they must have been wealthy). Being a seniors only development, we had a Home Owner's Association to enforce the CC&R's - Covenants, Conditions & Regulations. The property to the north of our development was planned to become a seniors only development like ours but since not all of our 116 lots were sold yet, it was just empty fields of weeds.

North of the empty fields of weeds lay the Soboba Indian Reservation. Most of the reservation was undeveloped fields of weeds also.

Our first summer of traveling and RVing together went very well. But when we got back to our homes in Hemet, the dozen or so residents, who spent the summer at their homes were very upset. It turned out that the Indians leased their empty fields of weeds to ranchers for grazing their cattle. During the dry, hot summer the cattle became aware that there was lush green grass south of their dry weed fields. They broke out of confinement and helped themselves to the lush green grass. They completely ignored our CC&R's.

Each summer for several years the lush green lawns were invaded by reservation cattle no matter how much fencing the Indians put up. The cattle always found a way to get out.

So, being seniors, a plan was created. While our friends and Dot and I were RVing one summer, the residents who stayed home were called early one morning and advised the cattle were on their way to our development. Seven or eight seniors sprang into action. Our development had around 30 homes by this time. Each lot had been provided with fencing on three sides by the developer. The open side faced the street. The easiest way for the cattle to enter our development was where our paved street ended at the edge of the field of weeds. Fortunately, the first lot, where our street met the field of weeds, was unsold and empty. Cars were positioned in such a manner that the cattle ended up in the empty lot. Then the cars were quickly repositioned so the cattle, including a huge bull with horns, were blocked in.

Animal Control was called and they arrived with a very large

truck. A car was backed out of the lineup so the truck could back in and be in position to receive the cattle. When the two animal control guys saw the bull, they decided they were not going into the lot as long as the bull was free to roam.

So, being seniors, several of them got a fist full of weeds which was used to lure the cow nearest the truck onto the bed of the truck. One by one all the cows were lured onto the truck. When the bull saw where all his girl friends had gone, he meekly joined them.

The next day the local newspaper proclaimed "Seniors Solve Problem". The problem was really solved by Animal control. When the cattle were unloaded, Animal Control took note of the brands on the cattle. In California, it's a law that all range cattle be branded and the brand and its owner be registered with Animal Control - including name, address and phone number. Each owner was contacted and given the choice of a hefty fine plus costs such as labor transportation, feed, etc. or donate the animal to be slaughtered, processed and given to non-profit organizations. All the owners chose to donate.

When we arrived home that year, the residents were ecstatic. No more cattle problems because by this time, the Indians were totally involved in their brand new Casino. Leasing their fields of weeds for cattle grazing was no longer in their plans.

"Everybody lived happily ever after."

Vicarage News

To friends dearly loved by the Brakhages and by our Lord Jesus Christ:

I cannot believe how quickly the summer flew by. September is here, school is back in session, and football has kicked off! Some OU season ticketholders from Holy Trinity have offered to take us along to see the Sooners, so look for the Brakhages on a jumbotron near you! Even without the football tickets, we could not have asked for a warmer welcome from our vicarage congregation. People have been incredibly friendly. Suzy has joined the adult choir and Graham comes to rehearsals and plays with the other kids in the back of the room. Several church families have invited us for dinner. Last month, all the staff and their families got together with new members who had recently joined the church for a barbecue at the pastor's house.

We still feel like we have a lot of people to meet, faces to learn and names to remember. It's a large congregation, but people have been infinitely patient with us. It's been fun to discover some connections we weren't aware of. So far, we've met some of Rosalie Weber's family, some of the Holts' relatives, and even some Brakhages(!) who worship here in Edmond. Some others are related to people I grew up with in Coffeyville, and a childhood friend is on the board of directors at the other LCMS church in Edmond.

Maybe the most pleasant surprise was bumping into a pair of familiar faces in the hall last month. I was just heading to the drinking fountain when I spotted Pastor B and Deon Hull visiting Holy Trinity on official Oklahoma District business. It's always good to see our CTR family and even better when they just happen to show up where you are. Given how busy it is around here on Sunday mornings, I'm not sure how often we'll make it to Tulsa this year, but it's a priority for us to stay connected to our dear friends at CTR.

I briefly mentioned the rigor of Sunday mornings here. We have four worship services each Sunday, and if you're scheduled to preach, you give the sermon at all four. That was me on my first weekend as vicar! I had the opportunity to preach in our three traditional services as well as the modern worship service. Most of the services are simply back-to-back. As soon as one is finished, you get ready to welcome a new group of faces for the next service. But from 11:00-12:00, there are two services going on simultaneously in different parts of the church. There's modern worship in the church's original sanctuary space while traditional worship is happening in the new sanctuary. And somehow, they've managed it where I can preach in one service, take off my robe and such, get into street clothes, and make it to the modern service just in time to present the sermon. It's some pretty tricky choreography, but I'm glad they already had it all figured out.

And if you preach on Sunday, then you're responsible for preaching on Wednesday. We have Wednesday night worship all year round. I am going to try to challenge myself on Wednesdays to preach exclusively from the Old Testament. I didn't grow up hearing too many sermons on the Old Testament, and the ones I did hear (Adam & Eve, Noah, Moses, David, etc.) you

heard over and over. I'd like to develop a greater level of comfort with the Old Testament texts, especially those less familiar books of the Bible. The Holy Spirit has preserved all 66 books of the Bible for a reason; let's see what treasures the Old Testament holds.

Wednesday night worship here is unique because all the hymns are chosen by request. Anyone in attendance can suggest what we sing next, providing a challenge for whomever is playing piano for worship. One Wednesday when I wasn't preaching, they asked me if I would play for worship. Our music director was out of town for a wedding, and the substitute canceled because her husband was in the hospital. I told them I'd play if I could reserve the right to veto songs I didn't know by heart. Luckily, no one picked anything outlandish, and I was able to stumble my way through the service. It went fine, but I'm hoping I don't have to pinch hit again any time soon.

I was talking about our music director with Pastor B during his visit to Edmond. I said he was the son of a Lutheran pastor, who moved here from another part of the country to pursue his doctorate degree from the University of Oklahoma, but is hungry to build the music program here. Pastor B then told me about your new music director, Jacob Drengler, and it almost sounded like we were talking about the same person! Obviously, both congregations are blessed to have young, talented musicians who are willing to serve and lead the musicians who offer their gifts to amplify the service of God. We will pray God's blessings on Jacob's ministry among you, and we know that you will support him with your time, your words and your eagerness to see CTR's music program flourish. We can't wait to hear how he's been able to build upon the solid foundation that you already have.

This past month afforded us ample opportunities to see family. My little sister is just a few hours away in Fort Smith, and she came over to spend the evening with Graham while Suzy and I had our first "date night" since he was born 14 months ago. Just before school started, Suzy's mum and elder sister visited with their little ones; Graham loves spending time with his cousins (and almost anyone who is his size!) Over Labor Day weekend, Suzy and Graham are joining my mom and sister on a road trip while I stay back home for worship. And Suzy and Graham got to meet a lot of the Brakhage family for the first time last month as we traveled back to Coffeyville for my grandmother's funeral. We saw aunts, uncles, and cousins who I hadn't seen in years. Many - just like me - are now married with kids, and Graham was excited to have so many young ones to play with.

My grandma never had the chance to meet Graham before she died. That realization probably hurt more than anything. Yet, I know that she is now surrounded by the family of God, celebrating her freedom in the presence of her Savior. And one day, I'll join her. And so will Graham. Praise be to Jesus Christ, who claims us in Baptism, joining us with Himself, and sealing us with the promise, "whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live." (Jn. 11:25)




Keeping Score


