

Fellow Redeemed,

How important is the Gospel? It is preeminent, supreme and of utmost imhigher, nothing sweeter, nothing that saves us apart from the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

What is interesting is that when many Christians are asked what the Gospel is, they have a hard time explaining it. The Gospel of Jesus Christ is this: Jesus is God's Son, who died on the cross to save sinners. That reality causes faith. This faith, created by God, includes recognition of sin, repentance from sin, forgiveness for those sins, reconciliation with God (living relationship), and a sanctified life by and through God's Holy Spirit.

Did you know that there are many threats to this Gospel? In our widow's/widower's Bible Study, on Wednesday mornings, we are walking through the book of Galatians. The firs thing that Paul addresses in this book is this, "I am astonished that you are so quickly deserting the one who called you by the grace of Christ and are turning to a different gospel – which is really no gospel at all" (Galatians 1:6). The Gospel can be almost too simple for us, and it is then that we sometimes feels the need to "beef it up", with things or actions that actually strip the Gospel of it's grace. Listen to what Francis Pieper, second president of the Mis-

souri Synod, says concerning this. "Ever mindful of the purpose of theology, which is to bring men to faith and thus lead them to heaven, the theologian must concern himself with the means by which this purpose is accomplished. He must not be beguiled into employing the portance. There is nothing means suggested by carnal wisdom, such as worldly might, external compulsion, state support, social affairs, and the like. Men are strongly tempted to employ these unchurchly means. But the only thing that achieves the purpose of theology and builds the Church is the Gospel, and only he is fitted for the ministry of the Church who firmly relies, for his success, on the divinely ordained means and knows that the Gospel of the grace of God, though mean and contemptible in the eyes of the world and his flesh, is the power of God unto salvation."

> It is the Gospel of Jesus Christ and, His death on the cross, that make atonement for our sins, lead us to faith in Him, and bring us into a living relationship with God. Nothing else is added. Nothing else is needed. Through the Gospel, and by God's grace, the Law of God becomes a blessing as well. In the freedom that comes from the Gospel, our relationship to the Law is one of deliverance. With the Gospel the Law becomes, as Jeremiah the prophet says, "as sweet as honey in my

Over the next few months, I would ike to use this article as an opporunity to share with you all some nsights into what I consider to be the most important role of the organist in Lutheran worship: leading congregational singing. Hymn playing is one of the areas which has often elicited the most comments and questions from the congregations that I have played for and so I think that it may be instructive to offer some information about my approach to this important aspect of worship leader-

ship.

It seems to me that the most logical place to start this series is at the beginning, that is, the hymn introduction. There are several main functions of the hymn introduction from my perspective, each of which will be addressed in this and subsequent articles. The first function is to ensure that the hymn tune is presented in such a way that the congregation is given sufficient reminder of the tune that is about to be sung, if is familiar, or to allow them to hear the tune in full if it is a new or less familiar melody. My approach to this will vary from hymn to hymn. On a hymn that is very familiar, such as Holy, Holy, Holy or A Mighty Fortress is Our God, I will often play a shorter, more improvisatory introduction that merely hints at the melody, rather than playing a straightforward statement of the entire tune. If the hymn is less familiar, or perhaps brand new to the congregation, I am more inclined to play through the entire hymn tune, often playing the melody of the hymn on a prominent solo organ stop, allowing the tune to be clearly heard.

The second and perhaps most important function of a hymn introduction is to in some way bring out the meaning of the text of the hymn; that is, to interpret the hymn musically. There are many ways to do this, and for the sake of brevity, I will limit myself to describing only a couple in this first article. In order to effectively interpret the text of a hymn, I always begin by reading through the whole hymn. Having done this, I underline a word or phrase which I feel captures the spirit of the text. Once I have done this, I work to find a musical way to interpret that

Perhaps the most basic way to bring out the meaning of a hymn in an introduction is through the judicious and thoughtful use of organ registration. Registration is the technique of selecting and/or combining various stops on an organ in order to create a particular sound. On the organ at CTR, registrational possibilities run the gamut from the whispers of the quietest String stops to the most thunderous combinations of Reed and Principal stops, and everything in between. Registration decisions are very free and often vary considerably depending on context. As an example, it would probably not make sense musically or textually to introduce O Sacred Head, Now Wounded on Good Friday using the same combination of sounds used to herald the beginning of Jesus Christ is Risen Today on Easter Sunday. Even if I am playing a very musically and technically straightforward hymn introduction, at a minimum it is my goal that the chosen registration conveys the mood of the text about to be sung.

Next month's article will continue the discussion of conveying the meaning of a hymn text through the introduction. It is my hope that through sharing some information about what the organ (and the organist) is doing in worship that it will help you all to more deeply consider the words which we sing together each Sunday as we join together to make a joyful noise.


Outreach Board — **Giving Tree**



Mission News Update

As we have traveled about, we have been asked for prayer concerns. In every place, we shared the frustration we have had with getting our background checks from Ghana accomplished and also done to the level that the Czech Republic requires. We thank all of you for your prayers because they are done! We were able to get very well documents from Ghana, and they have gone through further authentication here in the USA. So, praise the Lord, we have that done; and we are closer to returning now. In fact, we have decided to return to Prague sooner than later and work on our long-term visas from there. Keep the prayers coming! The Lord has been good to us!

One thing that has slowed us down is a health concern. Suzanne and Dale have regular skin cancer checks; and during our most recent one, a small melanoma was found on Suzanne's forehead. It does not look like it has spread or that there will need to be a lot treatment for this, but it has to come off. Because of the location, she will have to under-go general anesthesia and have a number of stitches. Her surgery is January 10th. We would greatly appreciate your prayers for the procedure and for her quick recovery.

Support Raising Completed

We were able to finish our very busy schedule of support raising in the month of December. Since September, we have visited 21 congregations and ministries, dropped in on 17 congregations as we traveled, preached 13 different sermons, and visited Mission Central in Mapleton, IA, and the International Center in St. Louis, MO. We were warmly received wherever we went, even the one time we came late by accident! And we were able to reconnect with previous supporters as well as encourage new ones. We thank God for this wonderful time of encouragement!

Christmas with Most of Our Family

Just as we were able to see our oldest child for Thanksgiving, so too were we able to see the younger two. We spent Christmas with our daughter, Gretchen, and her husband, Tom, and our grandson, Isaiah. We also had our youngest, Jonathan (center), who is serving in Virginia with the Air Force, fly in to spend Christmas with us. With a group call to Joshua in NC, we were all able to be together, at least electronically!

As we prepare to move back to Prague, there are a lot of little things that need to be accomplished, all of which can be nerve-racking. As always, this is a trip based on faith. We do not know where and to whom the Lord is leading. But we know that He goes with us. We pray that all will be accomplished in His time and by His grace. And we pray also that you, too, would know that the Lord goes ahead of you to lead and behind you to protect. Let us all be Epiphany lights,

shining the Light of Christ, because the days are evil and all people need to hear the love of God in Christ.

FINDING THE KEEPERS

Tom Brokaw wrote about "The Greatest Generation". Many of us fit into that category. But, do you realize how many changes we have endured? All the medical changes and advances are too numerous to enumerate here. But, here's a few common, ordinary things we can all relate to.

We were born before television as we know it today, before frozen foods, Xerox, Fax machines, voice mail, plastic, contact lenses, Frisbees, hula hoops and credit cards. We were before radar, transistors, split atoms, laser beams, and ball point or felt tip pens. Before pantyhose, dishwashers, clothes driers, electric blankets, air conditioning, drip dry clothes and before man walked on the moon.

We got married first and then lived together and clothes closets were used for clothes. Bunnies were small rabbits and rabbits were not Volkswagens. Having a meaningful relationship meant getting along with our cousins.

We thought fast foods were what you ate during Lent and outer space was the back of the local theater. We were before house husbands, gay rights, computer dating, dual careers and computer marriages. We were before day-care centers, group therapy and nursing homes. We never heard of FM radios, tape decks, electric typewriters, word processors, spell check, yogurt and guys wearing ear rings. For us, time sharing meant togetherness – not computers or condominiums. A chip was a piece of wood. Hardware meant hardware and software wasn't even a word.

Back then, "Made in Japan" meant junk and the term "making out" referred to how well you did on your school exam. Pizza, instant coffee, McDonalds and KFC were unheard of. We were used to buying things for a nickel or a dime at the 5 and 10 cent stores. Drug stores sold ice cream cones (full of ice cream) for a nickel or a dime. For 1 nickel you could ride a street car, make a phone call, buy a Pepsi or enough stamps to mail 1 letter and 2 post cards. You could buy a Chevy coupe for \$600 and gas for 11 cents a gallon.

In our day, grass was mowed, coke was a cold drink and pot was something you cooked in. Rock music was a Grandma's lullaby and AIDS were helpers in the principal's office. We were before sex changes, we bought only what we could afford, and we were the last generation that believed you needed a husband to have a baby.

I'm sure you can think of other things in addition to the above, but you get the general idea. Every change was not a negative one, but it's wearing on our constitutions to figure out which ones are the "keepers".

Vicarage News

To friends dearly loved by the Brakhages and by our Lord Jesus Christ:

Greetings from lovely Edmond, Oklahoma. I recently had opportunity to reflect on the great blessing it is to be serving our vicarage in a part of the country that I call home. Some of my classmates have had to deal with culture shock during their vicarage year, like my friend Nathanael who grew up in rural North Dakota but is serving his vicarage in suburban Seattle. There are a whole slew of vicarage opportunities - small-town Nebraska, inner-city Philadelphia, metro San Antonio - but I have been blessed to be able serve in a place where I already "speak the language." Understanding the history and culture of a place is a baseline for doing ministry anywhere and I have had a leg up by being able to serve in Oklahoma. I imagine I took this for granted until it was brought to my attention. Although having a vicarage in an unfamiliar locale provides certain learning opportunities, I think our family is plenty satisfied with a chance to spend a year close to home.

Speaking of being close to home, many of our friends at CTR have asked about when I am preaching here at Holy Trinity. I believe I have sent my preaching schedule to everyone who has asked, but it's possible that I've missed some people. I don't feel a need to advertise the dates broadly because I would never encourage you to miss a chance to worship with your CTR family in Tulsa, even if it means you'll be in worship with us in OKC. Supporting your friends and fellow redeemed at CTR with your presence is one of your greatest responsibilities as a member of Christ's church. The church suffers without you there to encourage and care for others. Likewise, you need to be there so others can encourage and care for you! If you still feel the desire to make the trip down the turnpike, you are always welcome at Holy Trinity. But you can also find our worship services and sermons online either on Facebook (https://www.facebook.com/ HolyTrinityOk/) or on YouTube (https://www.youtube.com/ HolyTrinityEdmond/videos) and save yourself the money on tolls.

At the end of the first six months of vicarage, students have the opportunity to meet with their supervisor for an overarching mid -term evaluation. This evaluation works both ways. My supervisor grades me in 33 areas of ministry and pastoral care (like teamwork, preparation, creativity, and time management.) He also submits a written assessment along with his scores to the Seminary. Additionally, I evaluate my supervisor and the learning experience I've had on vicarage. The Seminary seeks my feedback on my supervisor's accessibility, openness and leadership, as well as my observations on the health and personality of the congregation. I imagine this information weighs into my final vicarage grade and informs future vicarage placements. As I sat down with my supervisor, Pastor Barrie Henke, he offered me direct and constructive criticism as well as a great deal of encouragement. I feel he gave me much more credit than I deserve. I am blessed to have this learning experience and a supervisor who recognizes "vicar" is just another word for "student." I come to this role with lots to learn. I have certainly benefitted from being able to observe the work of faithful, experienced pastors like Rev. Henke.

Last month our congregation was touched by unimaginable tragedy. On a Wednesday morning, we learned that a little boy from Guthrie had been murdered. He was the 1-year-old grandson of members of our church. The boy's grandpa sits right beside me each Tuesday morning at our men's Bible study. To lose a family member – especially one so young – to senseless violence is heartbreaking. Yet, in this darkness, I have seen this church community wrap their arms around this hurting family. They have reflected the love of Jesus in their words and actions. As I write this update to you, we are planning the little boy's memorial service. He will have a Christian funeral and I imagine his grandparents will be surrounded by the care and support of their church family at a time when their biological family feels a deep sense of brokenness and loss.

There's an oddly specific hymn in our hymnals that I have looked at in the days since learning about this boy's death. When Aimless Violence Takes Those We Love is #764 in Lutheran Service Book. Praise the Lord that many congregations will never have the opportunity to sing this hymn, but it's lyrics seem appropriate in this situation. Here is a sample: "Our faith may flicker low and hope grow dim / Yet You, O God, are with us in our pain / You grieve with us and for us day by day / And with us, sharing sorrow, will remain. // Through long grief-darkened days help us, dear Lord / To trust Your grace for courage to endure / To rest our souls in Your supporting love / And find our hope within Your mercy sure." In the face of such a tragedy, we have nowhere else to turn than the mercy of God evidenced in the cross of Jesus. Our loving God didn't spare even His own Son from tragedy so that we could know the hope of everlasting life. I pray that this hope is shared with the hurting members of our church family at this sensitive time.

I've recently had a chance to do more teaching at Holy Trinity. In a later letter, I'll share a little about the unique pressures that come from substituting in our Sunday morning adult Bible class. But I spend most of my teaching time with middle schoolers. I teach 6th grade Bible classes each weekday at our school. We spent the entire fall semester studying the Old Testament. It gave us a solid foundation as we started studying the New Testament (and allows us to see why the arrival of Jesus is truly Good News!) There's something to be said for looking at the Christmas story outside of Christmas time. Reading the Bible's account of Jesus' birth without all the customary clutter of the Christmas season gave our kids the chance to reflect on the story with new eyes. They met a young family forced to come to grips with the out-of-nowhere announcement of an unexpected pregnancy. The kids liked recalling the moment they learned a little brother or sister would be joining their family and how it turned their lives upside down. It's in comparisons like these that I think they can reconnect with the real people in the Biblical narrative who often are portrayed as one-dimensional. Now that we're several weeks removed from Christmas, give yourself the pleasure of re -reading Matthew 1 or Luke 1; allow yourself to appreciate the enormity of this news and sympathize with Joseph or Mary who were forced to come to grips with their roles in God's mission of salvation in Jesus. And if you do, let me know what you discover.
