



Jacob Drengler Music Director

This is the third in a series of articles discussing the organ's role in leading congregational singing. The first two articles focused on the hymn introduction as a means to establish the tune about to be sung, as well as giving a sense of the spirit of the text of the hymn through the use of carefully chosen registrations (combinations of organ stops) and the use of various musical devices to paint a picture of the text. This article will shift focus from the introduction to the singing of the hymn to the singing of the hymn itself.

Following the conclusion of the introduction, it is the congregation's turn to join the organ in song. In leading congregational singing from the organ console, I endeavor to use the full tonal resources of the organ. I approach the process of selecting organ registrations for hymn stanzas in the same way that I approach the introduction; it always starts with reading the hymn text. I seek to capture the spirit of each stanza of the hymn through the judicious selection and combination of various organ stops. This means that I will typically change registrations on each stanza of a given hymn. If the text calls for it, I may even change registration during the course of a stanza. These registration changes need not always be drastic or dramatic (unless the text suggests such). The goal is always to highlight the text and support the congregation's singing, not provide a kaleidoscopic tonal demonstration of the organ. One of the delights of the organ is that it is able to evoke both the guietest prayer of lament and the loudest song of praise. I tend not to use both dynamic extremes on every hymn, but when a particularly evocative hymn text calls for it, it is certainly nice to have that option. To illustrate this process, here is a hymn text (We Praise You and Acknowledge You, O God, LSB 941), followed by a plan for how I might vary the registration for each stanza.

We praise You and acknowledge You, O God, to be the Lord, the Father everlasting, by all the earth adored. To You all angel powers cry aloud, the heavens sing, the cherubim and seraphim their praises to You bring: "O holy, holy, holy Lord God of Sabaoth; Your majesty and glory fill the heavens and the earth!"

Verse One: "The heavens sing" This stanza suggests a full sound. I would tend to begin with most of the foundation, reed, and mixture stops engaged, perhaps adding an additional stop or two at "O holy, holy, holy" to highlight the power of the moment when we join in the song of the Church in heaven.

The band of the apostles in glory sings Your praise; the fellowship of prophets their deathless voices raise. The martyrs of Your kingdom, a great and noble throng, sing with the holy Church throughout all the world this song: "O all-majestic Father, Your true and only Son, and Holy Spirit, Comforter. Forever Three in One!"

Verse Two: "Sing with the holy Church" Again, this stanza highlights the continuity of our song with the song of the whole Church on earth and in heaven. To highlight this unity of song, I would solo the melody line out on the rather telling Trompette en dehors stop, while playing the harmony voices on a full, warm combination of reed and foundation stops.

You, Christ, are King of glory, the everlasting Son, yet You with boundless love, sought to rescue everyone: You laid aside Your glory, were born of virgin's womb, were crucified for us and were placed into a tomb; Then by Your resurrection, You won for us reprieve and opened heaven's kingdom to all who would believe.

Verse Three: This stanza touches upon several mysteries of the faith; the Incarnation, Christ's Passion and Crucifixion, and the Resurrection. This is a rare instance where I would change registrations on almost every phrase in order to create a musical exegesis of the text. I would begin with a fairly full combination of foundation and reed stops to highlight the idea of Christ as "King of glory, the everlasting Son." For the next phrase, I would subtract all of the reed stops in order to create a less bombastic sound. At "You laid aside Your glory" I would further decrease the dynamic level by removing any higher pitched foundations sounds. The quietest moment would come when the congregation sings "Were crucified for us and were placed into a tomb." The final phrases would be supported by a sudden return to a full, triumphant sound when the text speaks of the Resurrection. By this point the registration would be nearly at full organ, reserving a few of the higher mixture stops and powerful pedal reeds for the final stanza.

You sit in splendid glory, enthroned at God's right hand, upholding earth and heaven by forces You command. We know that You will come as our Judge that final day, so help Your servants You have redeemed by blood, we pray; May we with saints be numbered where praises never end, in glory everlasting. Amen, O Lord, Amen!

Verse Four: "Splendid glory," "Praises never end." This stanza seems a most appropriate moment to unleash the full organ sound, omitting only those guieter stops which would cause tuning problems rather than add to the aural excitement. I envision the Church Triumphant singing before the throne of God. For the final "Amen" I would add the horizontal Trompette en dehors stop to the full ensemble; an effect which if used too often is overbearing, but in this case, seems almost necessary to capture the grandeur of the text.

Next month's article will focus on reharmonizations of hymns in order to reflect the hymn text, as well as the use of interludes between stanzas of hymns.





We ask for your prayers for our journeys and that the visa process will proceed smoothly.

Installations for Church Offices

On Sunday, March 3, our congregation in Prague celebrated a big day. First, Dale was installed as pastor of St. Michael the Archangel congregation. That installation will involve both the Eurasia Regional Director, Rev. James Krikava, and the Bishop of the Evangelical Church of the Augsburg Confession in the Czech Republic (ECAV v ČR), Rev. Marián Čop, who serves as the pastor of the Slovak congregation meeting in the same building. Then secondly, we installed Martin Damašek as a deacon, to serve the ECAV v ČR as well as to study for the office of pastor under the tutelage of Dale. Martin has already begun to help Dale, serving as a translator for us and the other two parishes that meet in the building (Slovak and Czech congregations).



Pursuing a career in service to the Lord through the church is a fulfilling opportunity, but it is not an inexpensive choice. Those who pursue professional church work many times incur educational debt, just like anyone else may do. Repayment of educational debt is often made more difficult by the more modest salaries of church workers, compared to other professions. In order to encourage and retain our professional church workers here at Christ the Redeemer, several years ago the congregation established a fund to assist our Pastors, DCEs and other synodically-trained church workers in repaying their student loans. This fund relies on the donations of our members here at CTR. The fund is currently in need of additional funds. Please prayerfully consider a designated donation to this cause. To friends dearly loved by the Brakhages and by our Lord Jesus Christ.

It was great to see so many friends on our recent visit to Tulsa. Worshiping with our CTR family is always a joy and spending time with you on a Sunday morning is a rare treat. We are glad we got to share the exciting things happening at CTR and in your lives. Catching up in person is always better than just communicating by newsletter article, but there were many people who we wish we had the chance to spend more time with. Please forgive us, and accept this heartfelt letter as a poor substitute for being with you face-to-face, at least until we are together again.

Along with making a trip to Tulsa, in the past month our family was treated to a visit by Jan & Del Dreyer and Diane & Ed Fager. Both families have been incredibly kind to us over the years in too many ways to mention. Diane and Ed have supported and encouraged Suzy in her career and Del helped shepherd me through my term on CTR's Board of Directors. We were honored to hear they'd be joining us for worship at Holy Trinity on a Sunday when I was preaching. It added a little extra pressure, but also made the day extra special. They also generously shared a meal with us, which afforded an opportunity to catch up with each others' lives. As we head back to St. Louis this summer and as ministry takes us to parts unknown down the road – we hope we can stay as connected as possible to the lifelong friends Christ has given us through our CTR family.

Things only seem to get busier for our family. Suzy's work has continued at its brisk pace. At the same time, she has picked up extra volunteer duties at church. Last month, Suzy began helping with Holy Trinity's media team, projecting slides during our 9:30 Sunday worship service. Suzy also has a lot of singing on her calendar as her adult choir will be doing a lot for the upcoming Holy Week and Easter services. Graham is busy too, adding molars, new words and phrases, and stubbornness. He loves reading books and has started filling in

words when you pause during some of his favorites. Graham is looking forward to springtime opportunities to spend more time outside; he's definitely a kid who appreciates the outdoors.

I have a busy stretch ahead, too. I will be preaching on both Maundy Thursday and Easter Sunday. I'll also get my first chance to

plan a Sunday worship service from scratch. Traditionally at Holy Trinity, the vicar gets to organize the Easter sunrise service, selecting the readings, the hymns and theme for the day. They try to hold the service outdoors beneath our church's bell tower unless the weather interferes. I haven't begun any worship planning, but for the sake of the others who will be involved in the service, I know I need to get started to give them plenty of time to prepare. I've gotten a small amount of worship planning experience on vicarage through our school chapel services. About once a month, I'm in charge of planning the 40-minute chapel service. That includes writing a skit, prepping a message, selecting songs and preparing PowerPoint slides so the kids can follow along. I also serve as regular chapel pianist. Preparing

chapel worship has been one of the most challenging parts of vicarage and I can imagine the Easter sunrise service will seem even more daunting.

To lead into the excitement of Holy Week, Holy Trinity throws a community Easter festival on the Saturday before Palm Sunday. They call it their "Easter Eggstravaganza." Along with the obligatory Easter egg hunts, the vicar is in charge of

sharing the Easter story to the children and families who attend. I'm looking forward to participating in another of Holy Trinity's beloved traditions. To get Lent started, our congregation held a "Farewell to Alleluia" music festival on Mardi Gras. Typically, we reserve our joyful "alleluias" during Lent, so we said goodbye with a musical flourish. The next day, almost 500 people joined us for Ash Wednesday worship. The evening service was perhaps the most moving Ash Wednesday service I've ever attended. I'm glad so many people were there to share it.

It's coincidental that at the same time ministry responsibilities here are increasing for the Easter season, the Seminary starts preparing vicars to return to campus for the Fall Semester. I seem to get weekly emails about housing applications, financial aid paperwork, and enrollment procedures. Last month, I had a 20-minute phone conference with the Seminary registrar's office. We talked about my course preferences for my final year in the classroom. I'll be taking elective courses for the first time in the Fall, which is pretty typical. You usually take a bunch of classes you need to have before vicarage, and when you return, you get to begin choosing classes that suit your interest. For the Fall, I'm hoping to get into classes on Athanasius and teaching Confirmation. In the Spring, I'm praying to be able to take a class on the Sermon on the Mount from Dr. Jeff Gibbs. He is the Synod's foremost authority on the book of Matthew. He's authored a 3volume commentary that serves as a benchmark for Biblical scholarship. Plus, he's simply a joy. He has a quick wit and a soft heart. (He's also given me the worst grade I've earned in a Seminary class so far.) I would gladly take a far worse grade to be able to have another opportunity to learn from him.

One final task a 3rd-year Seminarian has to complete is an outreach project. I have been working with a small task force of folks from across the Oklahoma District to prepare some digital outreach training for congregations. This is a project that was underway before we moved back to Oklahoma, but I am happy to jump on board and lend whatever help I can to the effort. We have been meeting, assembling resources, tip sheets, and training materials. I can't wait to see what comes of it!

We have expectant hearts fueled by the promise of Easter to come. Join us in joyful anticipation of the victory that awaits us all in Christ.


