




Fellow Redeemed.





LWML Mission Grant #3

But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy (1 Peter 2: 9-10).

For nearly 50 years, LAMP Ministry Inc. has ministered in northern Canada, where many villages are reachable only by aircraft or seasonal roads. Currently, nearly one million indigenous people live in these isolated areas with about half under the age of 14. The most alarming statistic is that over 15 percent of these children and youth will take their own lives out of despair and hopelessness.

Faced with the worldly influences and challenges of the internet and social media, and with limited opportunities for education and employment, the children and youth often feel despondent and discouraged. Sunday school, Christian youth programs, and regular worship services are rarely available.

Parents and grandparents of this younger generation were raised in residential schools away from home and the traditional family structure is non-existent. The younger generation lacks a sound model for parenting and family life.

On the Indian reserves, employment is limited, housing is limited, violence and drug abuse is higher than in most of the world, and life expectancy is between 45-55 years. LAMP goes into these communities offering the love of Jesus through parenting workshops, bereavement care training, VBS, Bible studies, and their testimonies of the hope found through faith in Jesus. The goal is to provide these communities with Christian education and witness to the Gospel.

To fulfill their mission of sharing the Gospel in the next few years, LAMP will need to expand their staff of full-time missionaries to four or five and recruit and train 100 to 200 more volunteer missionaries committed to serve at least five years.

This grant will provide funds to help LAMP reach the goal of hiring more missionary pilots and training more volunteers so that more communities can be reached with the love of Jesus and can be visited more than once a year. As the Gospel, our true source of comfort and hope, is proclaimed, local leaders are encouraged and built up to serve their own people. With the help of the Holy Spirit, the youth, knowing they are loved and cared for by the missionaries, will choose hope in Christ over suicide.

Mission News Update Dale's Ear Surgery -- Thanks Be to God!



We were concerned a little. After all, we were going to a hospital outside of Prague proper. English language skills here drop off quickly once you leave Prague proper. And that was definitely the case in Benešov! While the doctors all spoke English, there was barely any more of it from nurses, assistants, food servers, and even roommates. It put what little Czech we have learned to the test. But it went amazingly well! In fact, we thank and praise God that He

sent us kind and patient people who were a blessing.

The surgery that Dale underwent—a replacement of some of the little bones in the inner ear-can only be described as a success. There was a alitch. The bones were far more brittle than they expected, and they had to replace more in one place and less in another; but the surgery that went longer than expected has already provided amazing results.

They say it can take up to several months before hearing comes along as far as it is going to come. So, we will be patient and continue to pray to the Lord for Dale's ear to be restored. But, even now we can rejoice that a sense of spatial hearing has already returned and that he can now tell when someone on his right (the direction of the bad ear) is speaking to him. We will go with this step by step.

A Visit with Our Supporters

Prague is a favorite tourist destination; and, because of that, we often get emails from Lutherans who are planning to visit the city concerning our worship. But, recently, we were able to meet not just LCMS members but people who pray for and support us, Darrell and Lynda Bauman, from Iowa. We were able to share a Czech luncheon with them and to share with them about the town, our work, and how we are doing here. We encourage anyone who is visiting Prague to let us know. We would love to share with you what the Lord is doing here.

Sunday School and Adult Bible Class

On Sundays, we are holding a Sunday school for all ages. Currently, we have six youth who span from 4 to 14 years of age. Deacon Damašek is teaching on the account of the creation in Genesis. We have also included some hymn singing to teach the faith. Check out our Facebook page (www.facebook.com/kastersinprague) to see a video of it. As for our adult class, we are teaching St. Paul's letter to the Colossians. It is such a beautiful book on the person and work of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Look Ahead

Over the next month and a half, we will be very busy here. We have our American Thanksgiving luncheon. We will have Advent midweek worship (Thursdays as they work best for our members!) and of course the Christmas services that every church has. We are also planning a Christmas party for our Sunday School children—pizza and Red Boots for Christmas! Dale also continues to help with the Czech service, leading the pastoral parts in a very difficult language to pronounce. The local church body, the Evangelical Church of the Augsburg Confession in the Czech Republic (ECAVvČR), will also hold their annual meeting, a day and a half event, at the end of this month.

Please, pray for the ECAVvČR as it prepares to meet. And, please, pray for all our team here in the Czech Republic. Know that we pray for your parishes in the States!

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
Article XIV: Of Ecclesiastical Order





CTR Members Heading to Pasadena!

Bill and Patti Ross, Jackson Ross, and Max Baumann will be leaving for Pasadena to work as "Petal Pushers" on the 2020 Rose Parade floats. Last year, Teresa and David Nightingale joined Patti and Bill. "We decided we needed to recruit some younger folks to do the work on the scaffolds! We are aging out of that!"

The Lutheran Hour float shares the gospel of Jesus Christ through participation in the Pasadena Tournament of Roses Parade each year. Over 4,500 volunteers work to decorate floats as "Petal Pushers," who are coordinated by the Lutheran Hour Ministries (LHM) Float Committee. When each Petal Pusher walks through the door to the float building, there is an excellent opportunity for them to provide a Christian witness. When the finished float rolls down Colorado Blvd. on New Year's Day our Christian message is seen by over one million people on the parade route and another 200 mission plus TV viewers worldwide.

The theme of the 2020 Tournament of Roses Parade is "The Power of Hope!" and the LHM Float is "Anchored in Jesus". This will be the 70th year of having the LHM float in the parade—the only Christian float entry. And yes, Jesus will be back on the float!

There are some local connections to the LHM float. In 2017, in my role as Lutheran Women's Missionary League President, I had a once-in-a-lifetime experience of riding on the float. I was surprised and pleased by the war reception we received along the parade route from the audience being an unapologetically Christian float! We decorated for three days that year, made some great friends, and were amazed at the craftsmanship, design and mechanics of float building. The floats have to be covered 100% in organic materials. Seaweed, eucalyptus leaves, lima beans, corn husks, crushed rice, black pepper-all kinds of things besides just flowers which are added the last day.

Another "local" link to Oklahoma is the young pastor, Rev. Matt Nolte, a pastor at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Agoura Hills, California, who has represented "Jesus" on several LHM floats. Matt grew up in Enid and was a counselor at Camp Lutherhoma! Last year's float didn't have an adult Jesus on it (it had a manger scene) and parade goers were disappointed! This year he will again be on it. When I rode the float, the response to him was amazing before, during, and after the parade. People wanted to talk with him and he often had a group surrounding him. I couldn't help but think of the longing people have for their Savior even if it's only a regular person in a bad, black wig!



I'm hoping Jackson and Max will feel the excitement of seeing how all this comes together. Be sure to watch the parade on New Year's Day. If you want to come along next year, let me know! I'm hoping all my family members will get a chance in the coming years to experience this. Please keep the float

committee, riders, and workers in your prayers that they present a witness to the sure hope we have in Jesus Christ.

Seminary News

To friends dearly loved by the Brakhages and by our Lord Jesus Christ:

Writing this letter almost seems silly. It's barely November. By the time this message gets to you, our family will have experienced a major milestone. We await the birth of Baby Boy #2, who is expected to arrive around Thanksgiving. I wish we could share details like name, weight, length, etc., but it's too soon to know. We'll have to catch everyone up in 2020.

Thank you for always keeping our family in your prayers. It is an incredible blessing to know that you lift us up to our heavenly Father, especially with our family on the doorstep of some major life change. Doubling the number of sons needing to be fed, changed, bathed and entertained is just the beginning. We're also about to launch into a season of interviews and matchmaking as the Seminary looks to pair us up with a ministry context where we all can grow and thrive.

With our attention gobbled up by "big deal" things like babies and final placement, some of the smaller things often slip through the cracks. I want to share some of those, because they are a better reflection of what's going on in our day-to-day lives than just spending another letter talking about due dates and Call Day.

Suzy is working. At least, as I'm writing this letter. She continues to see students for speech therapy both at home and at school. One of the students she sees at the Seminary will soon 'graduate' from Suzy's care as he and his family move to New York, where his dad will begin serving as a pastor. The rest of Suzy's students will have to get by with a sub while she takes maternity leave after the baby.

Suzy is very, very pregnant. At least, as I'm writing this letter. But that hasn't stopped her from either organizing or participating in two of the biggest student events of the fall here at the Seminary. She led the Bible study component at a weekend retreat for the women of the Seminary. Then later that week, she tag-teamed with the student body president to throw a grown-ups only Halloween party. And in between, she has somehow found time to organize a bunch of newborn clothes, do a bunch of research on child safety seats, and accomplish all of our Christmas shopping. She's amazing, and that's revealed most often in how she flawlessly handles the "little things."

Meanwhile, I have been pouring most of my attention into being a student. I added a class after Fall Break so it has been a busy half-semester. I have been trying to work ahead in my classes to buy myself some breathing room once the baby arrives. Sometimes, that works. Sometimes it doesn't. I currently have two classes that each ask for you to do an insane amount of reading before each lecture. Somewhere in the ballpark 70-130 pages a night. Mostly in English.

In November, I had my theological interview with the faculty of the Seminary. All concluding students have to sit down with the professors. The faculty ask questions about what you believe and how it's going to impact how you'll serve as a pastor. If you ever experienced confirmation questioning, it's kinda like that. (Maybe that's where all these pastors got the idea from!) Of the three faculty members doing the questioning, I've only ever had

one of them. I am glad at least one familiar face is participating.

In between homework, our family has had the chance to enjoy the excitement of basketball season. The Seminary's basketball team is fun to watch, and the home games are played in the field house just a short walk from our apartment. The Concordia Seminary Preachers (yes, our mascot is a Preacher) tipped-off on the same night as the major college basketball season. And the Preachers came out with a win in their opening game. Which meant, the Seminary's team had a better record than Suzy's beloved Jayhawks (though KU was playing Duke, and the Seminary was playing a local chiropractic college.) Graham loves to cheer for the Preachers and point out the "daddies" out on the court. I am joining him in the bleachers, sparing him the embarrassment of watching me play.

Something we are looking forward to this month is the arrival of Advent at our church home here in St. Louis. I was giving the privilege of outlining the theme for our midweek Advent worship services and designing the services. After sketching things out, I worked with my supervising pastor and our congregation's music director to get things finalized.

Our theme is Christmastime in the City, and we are looking at the significance of the places in Jesus' story and how they shape our appreciation of Advent. God in His wisdom picked Nazareth as the place He'd send Gabriel to visit a young maiden, Bethlehem as the place where He'd invite shepherds to meet a King, and Jerusalem as the place where the eyes of a faithful churchman would light up at seeing newborn Jesus. He comes to specific people in specific places with a specific purpose. And best of all, He comes to you and me! The final week of the series is focused on St. Louis, because just as Jesus comes to the cities of Scripture, He comes wherever those Scriptures are opened and read.

One of the things our St. Louis church does to help give people that "sense of place" is through their annual live nativity. It's an event that welcomes 1000-2000 guests to our small, city campus each Advent. No matter the weather, 100+ volunteers dress in costumes and bring people to Bethlehem to see the Savior born for them. (We have definitely had people offer to let new Baby Brakhage play the role of Jesus.)

Where will you meet the Savior born for you this Advent? In worship, at one of CTR's beautiful special services? In Scripture? In Bible class? In your daily devotions? Maybe He'll come when and where you least expect it. Just like He did the first time. Just like He will again.



that has dealt with the nature of the Church's song, both from a specifically Lutheran perspective and from a broader, more global perspective. The songs which we sing and hear each time we gather for worship fill many roles within MUSIC Director the liturgy and our worship life together. Three of the primary functions of the

This month's article concludes a series

Church's song, according to Lutheran pastor, professor, and church musician Rev. Dr. Paul Westermeyer, are praise, prayer, and proclamation. Last month's article dealt with the function of music as proclamation. This month we consider the role of music as prayer. In The Church Musician Rev. Dr. Westermeyer writes:

"The song of the Church is also a song of prayer. The roots of temple and synagogue worship are a sung tradition, as are Christian liturgies of both the East and the West. Gregorian chant, which accompanied much of the Western liturgical tradition, is seen by some as prayer itself." (Paul Westermeyer, The Church Musician, Augsburg Fortress, 1997, 32)

Westermeyer also notes the importance of music as prayer within the Lutheran tradition, writing:

"Luther and the Lutheran church retained the singing of collects and indeed, the whole liturgy, and a large body of Protestant hymns are in fact prayers. Though the emphasis may differ, almost all traditions treat music as prayer in some way. That should not surprise us any more than using music as praise should surprise us. Human beings both laugh and weep. Laughter is the incipient form of sung praise, as weeping is the incipient form of sung prayer. The two often run into one another and cross." (Paul Westermeyer, The Church Musician, Augsburg Fortress, 1997, 33)

It seems especially appropriate to consider music as prayer as we enter into the season of Advent, that period of the liturgical year when we prepare our hearts to once again celebrate the birth of the One who came to us as an infant in Bethlehem. Many of the hymns of the Advent season may be sung and understood as

O come, O come, Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel, that mourns in lonely exile here Until the Son of God appear. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel! (O Come, O Come, Emmanuel, LSB 357, Stanza 1)

O Savior, rend the heavens wide; come down, come down with mighty stride; Unlock the gates, the doors break down; unbar the way to heaven's crown. (O Savior, Rend the Heavens Wide, LSB 355, Stanza 1)

Come, Thou precious Ransom, come, only hope for sinful mortals! Come, O Savior of the world! Open are to Thee all portals. Come, Thy beauty let us see; anxiously we wait for Thee. (Come, Thou Precious Ransom, Come, LSB 350, Stanza 1)

During this season of prayer and preparation, as we wait in joyful expectation of the One who was, and is, and will come again, may you all find hope, peace, joy, and love in the message of the good news of Jesus Christ. May the songs that we sing together always point to the One to whom they are addressed.

Wait for the Lord, whose day is near. Wait for the Lord: be strong, take heart! (Songs and Prayers from Taizé, GIA Publications, 1991, 12)
