Fellow Redeemed,

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and from the Lord, Jesus Christ. Amen.

I want to talk about God's hedge of protection. Satan mentions this hedge when God refers to Job and re-

gards Job as "blameless and upright". There indeed was a hedge around Job and everything associated with Job; the hedge was placed there by God. What a blessed life that must have been for Job.


There are many interesting things to ponder when we read this Scripture. First, Satan wants God to stretch out His own hand and strike at Job (Job 1:11). God will not do that. Instead, God puts Job into Satan's hands, and this He does by merely lowering the hedge of protection that is around Job. Please notice that God does not remove the hedge of protection, but merely lowers it. The hedge is always there, always.

After Job loses everything and is afflicted within an inch of his life, a conversation ensues regarding the nature and character of God. The age-old question is pondered, "Why do bad things happen to good people?" Job and his "friends" had a discourse that is as old as human thought. They conjecture and hypothesize and insinuate and even create ideas of who God is, how He operates and His very nature. All their pining is a mere chasing after the wind. What I mean is this. These men, and all men with them, see the wind and try to explain the wind, based on what the wind does and how it blows, and where it blows. But they never really get to the wind itself. That is precisely what is happening in the book of Job. During the time of the book of Job, there was no Word of God. People did not have a revelation from God Himself. They had not yet heard Him speak. He had not yet revealed to humans anything concerning Himself. So, men did what humans always do when there is a vacuum — they made it up. That is right. The philosophizing of Job and his friends are the mere imaginations of men who try to explain God, based on what they see in the world.

Then something amazingly terrifying happens. God speaks. Job 38:1-2, "Then the Lord answered Job out of the whirlwind, and said: Who is this who darkens counsel by words without knowledge?" At the voice of God Job can only do one thing, and it's the same thing every human in Scripture does at the voice of God — he cowers in fear and repentance. Job, and all of mankind with him, gets what he really wants: the revelation of God, through His Word.


By this revelation we now know God. We know His nature. We know how He operates. He works through His Son, Jesus Christ, who is the revelation of God become flesh. Jesus is God's hedge that now covers us. Christ's righteousness is the hedge that keeps Satan from having his way with us. The hedge is always there. Yes, you are hearing me correctly. The hedge in the book of Job, is none other than our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, and without that hedge Job was as good as dead.

Do not conjecture to know or understand anything about God outside of Jesus Christ. In Jesus, we know God and have heard God and have seen God. We thank You Lord, for the hedge of protection that surrounds us, even our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.

Mission News Update



The coronavirus kept us all at a distance—not only from others, but also from our own team members here in the Czech Republic. Therefore, it was a cause of great rejoicing for us all to be in one service together on 10 May, even with those hot masks on! We thank God that we all have re-

mained virus-free and that we have survived the current situation and are beginning to get things going again as we begin re-engaging with people to whom we share the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Prague at this time of year is usually filled with international tourists, especially in the old city with its famous sites: Prague Castle, Charles Bridge, Old Town Square, etc. We usually have tourists come to our congregation for worship-often LCMS members who find out to their surprise there is an LCMS congregation here in the city. This has hurt this important part of the Prague economy and, by extension, many people who make their living from that economy. Even now, as the restrictions are being eased, the only visitors seen around the city are Czech citizens because the borders are not open. The other day we took a tram to visit some members. It is always full, usually standing room only. But we were literally the only passengers on the tram. As you can imagine, this has hampered our outreach to the city. We are hoping, now that things are freeing up, we will find new ways to invite people to know Jesus and the peace He has come to bring. Please pray for us. Ask God to help us see new opportunities. And ask God to give us the Holy Spirit, that our words may be filled with grace and power so that many might come to the faith, to the praise and glory of God.

One of the reasons we came to work in the Czech Republic was to work with Martin Damašek. I am to train him for the pastoral office. Right after arrival, he was ordained a deacon in the Evangelical Church of the Augsburg Confession (ECAV). Our work has gone more slowly than I expected. Martin is a busy guy. He teaches English in school, serves on city council, and is working on a Ph.D., on top of what we are doing. It has been a true joy and pleasure to work with him. Martin has assisted with catechesis with a member who is Czech and whose English is not up to the task. (Her English is better than our Czech!) He preaches about every 6 weeks. He helps in pastoral care of members. And he is an invaluable source of language help, cultural help, ministry help, and just a wonderful friend. He is a blessing to the ECAV as well as to us. Please keep him in your prayers.

Our family has fared well during this pandemic. Dale's mother and aunt are both in good health. Our older son's (Joshua) wife, Sarah, is expecting their second child in October. Their daughter, Rachel, is so cute and getting big. Our daughter, Gretchen, is also pregnant with her and her husband's (Thomas) second child, due 9 June. Their son, Isaiah, is doing well. Our younger son (Jonathan) put on sergeant stripes in the US Air Force. We are hoping to arrange a home visit later this year to meet the two new grandchildren.

Now that the Hoffmanns, who lived in Olomouc, have returned to the States, our trips east to minister to our two lay missionaries will take us to the town of Haviřov. There we can meet with Ben and Chelsea who are doing great work among the youth of that area. The trip will be a little longer, as it is farther, but we are looking forward to seeing some areas we have never been to, as well as supporting these two servants of Christ. Our first trip will be 7-9 June.

Please pray for our ministry team here in the Czech Republic, as well as our visa renewal.

To friends dearly loved by the Brakhages and by our Lord Jesus Christ:

We're going to be Oklahomans again!

Call Day 2020 came with the great surprise that we were heading back to Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Edmond, the site of our vicarage last year. It is not unusual for a congregation to bring back a former vicar as their pastor. What is unusual is that our seminary journey brought us from Oklahoma to St. Louis to Oklahoma back to St. Louis and back to Oklahoma again! I think the Lord recognizes Oklahoma is such a special place to call home. We are looking forward (joyfully!) to calling Oklahoma home again.

It was truly a surprise. Since Call Day was an online pre-recorded service this year, I've had people ask whether we knew in advance about where we were going. The answer is no. I even asked the Seminary if we would be getting in advanced warning – given the complicated state of the world and the fact that we all have to move soon – and I was told "absolutely not!" Some traditions can't be broken by COVID-19.

We managed to find a house in Edmond about 3.5 miles from the church. It's in a good neighborhood with a community pool and playground. Suzy and I are most excited about the garage! We've been parking our cars outside for the past 4 years; it'll be good to get them back inside. We are going to experiment with giving Graham and Luke their own rooms. With their sleep routines, that's what makes sense right now, but Suzy is eager to see if they have success sharing a room when Luke is beyond the newborn phase. Please note our new address at the end!

Going back to a place like Edmond means Suzy does not have to start from scratch finding work. She has already been in contact with old employers and will also return to serve the kids at Holy Trinity Lutheran School. Graham will go to preschool at Holy Trinity two mornings a week. He is eager to be around kids again after this extended social distancing. And we think preschool will serve Graham well at encouraging him to understand and appreciate structure and boundaries.

As for me, I'll be serving as the associate pastor for congregational care and discipleship. I will be in charge of adult education, junior confirmation, new member classes, small group ministry, pastoral visitation, and congregational events. Additionally, I will preach and lead worship on weekends. When not crippled by pandemic, Holy Trinity has four Sunday worship services, bringing together between 500-600 each weekend in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

When things are back to *normal* – whatever that means - Suzy will likely return to singing with the adult choir and helping with the church nursery, VBS, and Sunday school. Graham will be happy to be back in a community filled with music and friendship. Many of our old friends will be looking forward to greeting Luke, who was still in Momma's tummy when we left.

We will also be glad to be so close to our family of faith at CTR! I know we had the chance to see some of you over our vicarage year – either in our trips to Tulsa or yours to OKC – and I expect that we will continue to bump into one another. I've gotten used to seeing Suzanne and Pastor B at Oklahoma District church workers' conferences. And I am as eager as you to see the building project come together and to see how the Lord uses the expanded space at



CTR to serve more people with the Gospel. I am glad that we will have the opportunity to remain connected after all you've done to invest in our seminary preparation.

This is our last newsletter article. Along with all the articles that preceded it, this letter to you is written with the acknowledgement that none of this would have happened without you. You are a priceless, inseparable part of our family's journey. I tear up when I'm given the chance to answer the question: "So what made you want to become a pastor?" The encouragement of our CTR family always features prominently in the retelling. Questions like "Have you thought about being a pastor?" became "Would you think about being a pastor?" as brothers and sisters at CTR became instruments of the Spirit's leading.

You have never failed to make us feel supported. From the generous gifts, to the notes of encouragement, to the many prayers, you've taken care of us financially, emotionally, and spiritually. You've given us this space to offer updates from our adventures and you've cared for Luke and Graham as if they have always belonged to CTR. Thank you. Thank you. Thank you. Please receive our meager appreciation, knowing that through Christ working in you, you have brought us to the point of ordination. We could never repay your generosity, but we will never *forget* your generosity.

The best ways I can think to honor your great contributions to our family is to tell others, and to encourage you to continue in generosity. One from your midst is about to undertake the same journey into ministry. Deon Hull and his wife, Debra, will soon be moving into the same apartment complex we just left. They will know the joys of classroom discoveries, the struggles of term papers and language labs, and the heartache of being separated from family. And just as we have, I pray they will know the comfort that comes from having a church family investing in their journey: prayerfully, encouragingly, and financially.

Jacob Drengler Music Director Many of the great hymns of the Christian faith originated during times of upheaval, either personal or societal. Consider the work of Paul Gerhardt (1607-1676), perhaps the finest German hymn-writer of the seventeenth century. Seventeen of Gerhardt's hymns appear in *Lutheran Service Book*,

including "A Lamb Goes Uncomplaining Forth" (LSB 438), "Upon the Cross Extended" (LSB 453), "Awake, My Heart, With Gladness" (LSB 467), "Evening and Morning" (LSB 726), and "Now Rest Beneath Night's Shadow" (LSB 880).

Gerhardt endured remarkable difficulties throughout his life. His early years were marred by plague, the death of both parents, and the ravages of the Thirty Years' War. His adult life was marked by the death of his wife and four of their children and periods of intense religious conflict. In spite of these almost unimaginable circumstances, Gerhardt's hymn texts radiate sure and certain confidence in the goodness and mercy of God and the redeeming work of Jesus Christ.

Consider the hymn "Evening and Morning".

Evening and morning, sunset and dawning, wealth, peace, and gladness,
Comfort in sadness: these are Thy works; all the glory be Thine!
Times without number, awake or in slumber, Thine eye observes us,
From danger preserves us, causing Thy mercy upon us to shine.
Father, O hear me, pardon and spare me; calm all my terrors,
Blot out my errors that by Thine eyes they may no more be scanned.

Order my goings, direct all my doings; as it may please Thee, Retain or release me; all I commit to Thy fatherly hand. Ills that still grieve me soon are to leave me; though billows tower,And winds gain power, after the storm the fair sun shows its face.

Joys e'er increasing and peace never ceasing: these shall I treasure And share in full measure when in His mansions God grants me a place.

To God in heaven all praise be given! Come, let us offer And gladly proffer to the Creator the gifts He doth prize. He well receiveth a heart that believeth; hymns that adore Him Are precious before Him and to His throne Like sweet incense arise.

A Dictionary of Hymnology by Anglican clergyman John Julian (1839-1913) rather delightfully describes this as "a splendid hymn of our poet, golden as the sun going forth in his beauty, full of force and of blessed peace in the Lord, full of sparkling thoughts about God." As typically Victorian as Julian's glowing description is, Gerhardt's language in the second and third stanzas, "calm all my terrors, blot out my errors" and "Ills that still grieve me soon are to leave me" bring to mind the words of Jesus in John 16: "In this world you will have trouble." While we know this to be true, we also know that it is not the end. Jesus went on to tell his disciples, "Take heart! I have overcome the world." The One who has overcome the world is our source of joy and peace.

Even as we move through days of uncertainty and doubt, we cling to the One who is our Rock and our Redeemer. Gerhardt knew this and expressed it in the final stanza of his Christmas hymn, "All My Heart This Night Rejoices."

> Dearest Lord, Thee will I cherish. Though my breath fail in death, Yet I shall not perish, But shall dwell with Thee forever There on high, in that joy which can vanish never.

for a time, the mission of the LWR Quilt and Kit Ministry remains as strong as ever.

During the month of June, we will be accepting donations of items for the Personal Care Kits. Items included are light weight bath towels, 4-oz bars of soap, large sturdy combs, combination nail file/clippers and toothbrushes. During the months of July and August, we will be collecting items for School Kits. The items needed include 70-count



spiral notebooks, large erasers, 48-count crayons, #2 unsharpened pencils, blue and black ink pens (no gel ink), rulers with centimeters included, blunt-tip scissors and pencil sharpeners. Here is an update from Michael Bryan.

"We actually expanded beyond the bus stop to doing street ministry with all the displaced people. The existing shelters dropped to 1/3 capacity with limited personnel onsite. I've been personally down next to John 3:16 and Salvation Army. Neither one is able to keep up with sanitation issues and the homeless just congregate around the entrances to the day centers because they can't let them in. We've been driving around handing out supplies and lots of prayers. It seems like water is in very short supply to the homeless right now and sanitation access. We try to stop underneath the bridges where many are sheltering, as well. We've also been going out multiple nights a week to try to help out as well, since most other groups have stopped. With the better weather we are going to be visiting the Sand Springs River Camp and see if Abba has something for us to assist there as well. Thank you for asking it's been eye-opening to see what happens when society kind of breaks down. The homeless took it on the chin. I sure miss Sunday Bible Study." 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0 R N E Article XXII: Of Both Kinds in the Sacrament


1] To the laity are given Both Kinds in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, because this usage has the commandment of the Lord in Matt. 26:27: Drink ye all of it, 2] where Christ has manifestly commanded concerning the cup that all should drink. 3] And lest any man should craftily say that this refers only to priests, Paul in 1 Cor. 11:27 recites an example from which it appears that the whole congregation did use both kinds. 4] And this usage has long remained in the Church, nor is it known when, or by whose authority, it was changed; although Cardinal Cusanus mentions the time 5] when it was approved. Cyprian in some places testifies that the blood was given to the people. 6] The same is testified by Jerome, who says: The priests administer the Eucharist, and distribute the blood of Christ to the people. Indeed, Pope Gelasius 7] commands that the Sacrament be not divided (dist. II., De Consecratione, cap. Comperimus). 8] Only custom, not so ancient, has it otherwise. But it is evident 9] that any custom introduced against the commandments of God is not to be allowed, as the Canons witness (dist. III., cap. Veritate, and the following chapters). 10] But this custom has been received, not only against the Scripture, but also against the old Canons 11] and the example of the Church. Therefore, if any preferred to use both kinds of the Sacrament, they ought not to have been compelled with offense to their consciences to do otherwise. And because the division 12] of the Sacrament does not agree with the ordinance of Christ, we are accustomed to omit the procession, which hitherto has been in use.
