Outreach News

South Tulsa Community House

CTR members continue to make donations of non-food items to South Tulsa Community House (STCH). Although our usual number of people coming to church regularly on Sunday has been low because of virus restrictions, a faithful few are contributing much needed items, especially those that can't be purchased with food stamps. They exclaim over the useful items of soaps, paper products, and household supplies, grooming items, toothpaste, and baby items that can be very expensive to buy.

So, please continue to fulfill a need of a family when you are out shopping. We pick up the items from church on Wednesdays and deliver to STCH on Thursdays. It really helps! If you want to help and can't go shopping, we'll shop for you. Leave a check in the office and designate it to "Outreach Ministry-STCH". STCH is currently not taking any food items or plastic bags at this time.

Feeding People through Sunday School Offerings

Even though we did not meet for Sunday School during the second quarter of the year, Sunday School offerings came in! With the match from the Outreach budget, CTR sent a check to the Community Food Bank of Eastern Oklahoma in the amount of \$562.50. This is so helpful during this time of high unemployment and children home during the summer. Thank you for feeding God's children. If you would like to contribute what you would usually be putting in the Sunday School offering, leave a check to CTR in the office with the designation "Sunday School Offering".

Missionary Support

Support from the Outreach budget continues for several missionaries: Rev. Dale and Suzanne Kaster in the Czech Republic, Antoine Lutz in Papua New Guinea, and Rev. Chehab, Salam Christian Fellowship in Illinois.

Blessings to all of the Christ the Redeemer Lutheran Church. I want to thank you all for taking a moment to hear the good news of the preaching of the Gos-



pel, the healing of the sick, and the lifting up of hearts as Tulsa Saints witnesses each Friday night in downtown Tulsa at the Denver Municipal Bus Station on 4th Street between Denver and Cheyenne.

What a time we live in. When COVID-19 struck, many services in Tulsa were shut off for the homeless and needy. Immediately, we noticed more hardship cases as people lost jobs, stress levels increased, and services that were once available were no longer there. We quickly began to run out of supplies such as toiletries, clothing, and other necessities.

Our team got together, prayed to Abba for guidance and the Holy Spirit led us to not only continue our Friday night mission, but we increased our footprint by going to the river camps on Wednesday evenings to help preach the Gospel and minister to those living there.

The one thing I have learned is God will use us not only when things are pleasant but also when times are tough. We never are to let fear stop us and we must trust the Holy Spirit to comfort and guide all our way. 



In his 1528 treatise "Confession Concerning Christ's Supper" Martin Luther described God in this way:

God is a supernatural, inscrutable being who exists at the same time in every little seed, whole and entire, and yet also in all and above all and outside all created things. Nothing is so small but God is still smaller, nothing so large but God is still larger, nothing is so broad but God is still broader, nothing so narrow, but

God is still narrower. God is an inexpressible being, above all and beyond all that can be described or imagined.

This description brings to mind a quotation from the English writer and philosopher Aldous Huxley, "after silence that which comes nearest to expressing the inexpressible is music."

Luther well understood the ability of music to "expressive the inexpressible" mysteries of the faith and unite believers around the truth of God's Word. Luther further wrote of music's capacity to, "comfort the sad, encourage the despairing, humble the proud, calm the passionate, and to silence those full of hate." The Church's song is a global one that has resounded through the centuries, transcending geographical, denominational, and racial barriers.

That song has continued through times of adversity, sustaining and nurturing the faith of believers. Through that song, historically marginalized communities have given voice to prayers of hope, resilience, justice, and peace. In joining in that song we become a part of something which encompasses believers of all times and places, voices raised in praise of the Creator of the universe.

During these past months, the Church's song has taken on a different form than we have come to expect. Global events have required church musicians around the world to find new methods of offering and presenting that song in worship in ways that care for the physical wellbeing of the people they are called to serve. It has required worshippers to hear and to participate in that song in a new way. Despite all this, in the words of a well-loved hymn, "through the Church the song goes on." Soli Deo Gloria!

In closing, here is a brief verse from Martin Luther's "A Preface for All Good Hymnals:"

Of all the joys upon this earth
None has for mortals greater worth
Than what I give with my ringing
And with voice sweetly singing.
There cannot be an evil mood
When there are singing folk so good
But God in me more pleasure finds
Than in all joys of earthly minds
To God I give my melody
And thanks in all eternity.

This is the work and joy of the Church. The local congregation is a seminary in the literal sense of that word, which means "seedbed." In it, God abundantly sows His seed of the Holy Scriptures. Those words come into our ears and, further, even into our hearts, creating faith that clings to Jesus for salvation. Those words become visible in the Sacraments-water, bread, and wine— and deliver to us the forgiveness that Christ has won for us. And through these, the Christian grows to become a healthy seedling and then onto maturity and, from there, becomes a bearer of fruit. It it is as the reproductive cycle of plants: seeds to plants, plants to seeds, and the whole thing continues on in perpetuity. This means we are all missionaries of a sort. True, some have answered the call to be a "professional" missionary, those who engage cultures not their own with the Word of God. That includes learning languages, learning about the culture, and finding ways to bring that Word to people outside of the Church. But still, all Christians are missionaries at the very least in the lives that they live to the glory of Christ and in the calling of ever more sheep to hearken to the voice of the only Shepherd who can truly be called good. We—you there, and we here—are all a part of letting the world know the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We are blessed to be a blessing. We ask for your prayers for Richard and his formation as a pastor. But we also ask for your prayers for us, that our open-door and open-heart would be inviting to the next people who come to be fed and sent to be a part of the calling to the world. And know that we pray for the same thing for you and your congregation. Christ's return is ever drawing closer, therefore, let us be about His work.

A Baptism

This month brought one of those moments that is a cause of great celebration—a child was baptized into Christ and into the Church. The family of the child are old friends of our Eurasia Regional Director, Rev. James Krikava. So, of course, he performed the Baptism and, led us in singing praises to our gracious God. Currently, we are catechizing two adults, one for Holy Baptism and the other for membership in the Lutheran Church. We thank the Lord of the Church for the growth that His Holy Spirit brings.

A New Way to Stay Linked to Us

When the Coronavirus closed down public worship, we adapted and started live-streaming services via our congregational Facebook page. From its reception, we realized that perhaps this is something that we should somehow keep in part. So, now, we are using the internet to publish a podcast of the sermon for each Sunday. You can find our podcasts here on Podbean. The files are in MP3 format, so they should be able to play on most players. Come by our site and check out the sermons we have already posted as well as check in with us each week as we bring the living Word of God to the people of Prague.

Czech Lessons

We are still taking lessons in the Czech language. It seems to us that the more we study, the harder it seems to get. Czech has a very hard syntax. And it also is a challenge to hear with an uninitiated ear. So, we are a year into our Czech lessons and are still trying to use this language. But word by word, we are slowly making headway and, even more, we are honoring the people of Prague by trying to use the language that they themselves know is hard.

God Be with You!

It is hard for us, as Americans, to hear of the problems that our nation is going through. We are praying that God would use even the troubling times there to be an open door for many to share Christ. Please, remember that the Lord is indeed Lord and will never will forsake you!

Patient Attention - Valuable Discoveries


For many people, the coronavirus pandemic has been a test of patience - or worse. Medically vulnerable people face an anxious time of hypervigilance. Furloughed workers wait on hold or in lines for assistance. Special events have been canceled or rescheduled.

Those not impacted directly deal with assorted frustrations and inconveniences. Many people are learning the benefit of slowing down, being present (even virtually) to others and practicing patient attention.

Interestingly, scientist Isaac Newton did some of his best work when the plague forced Cambridge University to close. Seminary News

Greetings from Concordia Seminary, St. Louis! Debra and I would like to express our gratitude to all of those who support us through prayers, notes, and finances. We cherish your encouragement as we start our four-year journey through Seminary.

Some of you reading this may have no idea who I am, so allow me to introduce myself and my family. I am the product of the Lutheran school system from the time I was in Kindergarten through college. I spent my childhood in the suburbs of Chicago during the school year, and my grandparents' farm in central Illinois during the summers. My family members were and are my primary source of spiritual growth, and I am honored to move that legacy forward by becoming a Pastor.

My wife, Debra, and I have been married over 30 years. We met at Concordia College, River Forest, IL. Debra was in the Teacher Education program, and I was focused on the vocation of Director of Christian Education. Deb took a teaching position in New York City while I finished school. We were married, and I joined Deb in New York after I graduated. This was the start of a 30-year journey that has taken us through several phases in career and family.

We have three grown sons: Peter (Tulsa, OK), William (Ft. Riley, KS), and Steven (Dover AFB, Dover DE). They were all born in Lakeland, Florida where we were teaching, and I was also engaged in Youth Ministry and coaching. Our next stop was Woodlands Lutheran Camp, where I served as the Program Director and Deb served in various roles. The Lord then led us to Walcamp in northern Illinois, where I served as Executive Director. I continued in that role at Camp Loughridge in Tulsa, OK. My latest Ministry position was the Mission Developer for the Oklahoma District of the LCMS.

In each position and each phase of life, we have accumulated practical experience in ministry. Being a life-long learner, I have continually searched for resources and people that expanded my understanding of the world and the Kingdom. This phase, however, will be a directed and focused continuation of God's guidance in my life. Since I have been in Ministry for about 30 years, I think of it as a retooling so that I can fulfill a different role in the Kingdom, the role of Pastor, as God sees fit.

I appreciate that not everyone has a grasp of the process involved in becoming a Pastor in the Lutheran Church, so allow me to help you understand. The program that I am in, the Master of Divinity (M. Div. for short), is a vocational degree and is much like the program a medical doctor completes. It is a combination of classroom learning and application through experience in the field. One must meet academic requirements to qualify for the program. A knowledge of basic concepts in Lutheran Theology, Old Testament and New Testament studies, and the original Biblical languages of Hebrew and Greek must be established through undergraduate classes or tests. If one does not demonstrate those competencies, they can take classes to meet the requirements.

During the first two years, I will spend much of my time in the classroom and will also be assigned to a congregation for what is called field work where I will gain experience serving in a congregation. After two years of study, I will have a one-year internship called a vicarage. Vicars are assigned to a congregation

where they practice preaching, teaching, celebrating the Sacraments, and working together with the members of a congregation to advance the Gospel in their community. Having completed vicarage, I return to the seminary for one more year of intensive study that is more focused on where the Lord is leading me in His Ministry. The culmination of the seminary experience is ordination into the public ministry and Installation into a congregation. Then the real work begins.

For me, the path starts with a summer class in Biblical Greek. As of this writing, I have only been in Greek for a week but I am doing well. Pastors Burmeister (Christ the Redeemer, Tulsa, OK) and Tiews (Trinity, Okmulgee, OK) guided me in some of the basics prior to seminary to avoid being overwhelmed in the first week. It's like going back to kindergarten. Over the span of seven weeks, our class will progress from learning the alphabet to college level Greek. Trying to learn a new language in that time frame is comparable to trying to drink from a fire hose! After I complete the class, I should be able to decipher, with the help of tools, the text of the New Testament in Greek. Next summer, I will take Hebrew in the same way.

It is reasonable to ask why the seminary requires the original languages as a basis for our education. My Greek Professor, Dr. David Lewis, describes the difference between English translations and the original Greek texts through an analogy. It is like the difference between watching a full screen movie theater production of a classic action movie or watching the movie on TV. A great epic story like Star Wars in the theater is shown on a broad screen and the action spans from one side to the other. The music is full, and the sound attacks your senses from every angle to the point that you not only hear it but feel the action. The television version is formatted to fit a smaller screen and the sound is compressed.

The faithfully translated English texts are still inspired and create faith in the hearer, yet there is a depth of understanding that is available in the Greek that does not naturally flow to the translations due to imprecision in the English language. This is sometimes why translations vary in their word choices, as you may have experienced in Bible classes.

Lutheran Pastors should be able to, according to the seminary, provide the depth that may be missing in passages to their listeners and students of the Word. I am blessed to have the opportunity to learn Biblical Greek and hopefully become proficient.

I thank God that He has provided this opportunity for us through those who support us with prayers, encouragement, and finances. This month we ask you to pray for...

- the ability and capacity to continue to successfully complete my studies of Greek.
- Deb's company to allow her to continue to work remotely from St. Louis.
- for the continuation of the ministry that I left to attend Seminary.
- for other members of the Body of Christ to join in supporting this venture.
