

Fellow Redeemed,

This Christmas take a walk with me along the north shore of the Sea of Galilee. The

lush green of the rolling hills is contrasted by the black basalt rocks that litter the landscape. As we make our way over a gradual incline, we see the town of Capernaum nestled between the crystal blue waters of the lake and the rolling hills that cradle this town like a baby. People are busy greeting each other as they move between the ancient synagogue and Peter's house. Just round the corner is the tax collector's booth. Levi is busy collecting the taxes that are necessary for the security that Herod Antipas provides. That is when we see Him, Jesus of Nazareth. He moves with purpose but never in a rush. He takes an interest in the tax collector and moves in closer. Jesus motions to Levi with his hands and speaks the words that are the call to every human being, "Follow me". In a moment of pure and honest repentance, Levi gets up, leaves his life as a tax collector behind, and follows Jesus. Hear the account from the Gospel of Mark.

Mark 2:13-17: He (Jesus) went out again beside the sea, and all the crowd was coming to him, and he was teaching them. And as he passed by, he saw Levi the son of Alphaeus sitting at the tax booth, and he said to him, "Follow me." And he rose and followed him. And as he reclined at table in the house, many tax collectors and sinners were reclining with Jesus and his disciples, for there were many who followed him. And the scribes of the Pharisees, when they saw that he was eating with sinners and tax collectors, said to his disciples, "Why does he eat with tax collectors and sinners?" And when Jesus heard it, he said to them, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick. I came not to call the righteous, but sinners."

The beauty of the region around Capernaum is only surpassed by the amazing beauty of the forgiveness of sins to sinners. Jesus came

to save us. We are sinners and we need Jesus, who bestows upon us His righteousness. What a beautiful sight it is to see Jesus motion to us and say, "Follow me". We, like Levi, have gotten up and continue to follow Jesus. He leads us down paths of righteousness for His name's sake. Amen.

As 2020 winds down, the need on the streets goes on. Messiah said in John 12:8, "For you always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me." The indignity Judas showed when Mary poured the expensive perfume on Jesus before his crucifixion. What did he mean by this? You will always have the poor? This saying goes back to the Torah, which Jesus used throughout the Gospels (the word of God) against the Pharisees and Sadducees. From Deuteronomy 15:7-8 "If there is a poor person among you, one of your brothers, in any of your towns in your land which the LORD your God is giving you, you shall not harden your heart, nor close your hand from your poor brother; ⁸ but you shall fully open your hand to him, and generously lend him enough for his need *in* whatever he lacks. From the beginning Abba has wanted us to help those in need.

It's hard to believe it has been over two and a half years since we began helping people. I remember a certain corporate manager from a few years ago who on Friday nights would drive down past the bus station on 4th Street between Denver and Cheyenne, having a hard heart and looking on the homeless and downtrodden with disdain. Through the grace of Messiah by his mercy and salvation, I was given the opportunity to work with other assistant shepherds to help those on the Tulsa Streets. This is a blessing the Father gives us each week to help those who are most in need.

Each week we bring hot food, healthy snacks, socks, blankets, coats and other winter clothing, sleeping bags, toiletries, Bibles, coffee, and sometimes special requests if we can help out someone in need.

Recently, we sponsored a homeless gentleman by the name of David, who attends sometimes Christ the Redeemer and the Sunday school. David was an avowed pagan until Jesus opened his eyes to the truth of the Father's love for all of us.

Even through these trying times, the Tulsa Saints continues to be downtown every Friday night, rain or shine, snow or sleet, even in this time of pandemics and civil unrest. As we move forward in this mission for God, we ask each and every believer to pray for the homeless and working poor and ask the Father to continue to guide the Tulsa Saints in all we do. God Bless and the Peace of Jesus our Messiah be with you all.

Richard J. Foster (Celebration of Discipline)





Confirmation students have 2 choices for classes this fall:


- Sunday School from 9:30-10:30 am for 6th grade 8th grade

My mom, Doris Hull, had successful surgery after a fall and is recovering quickly.


Deb and I are in good health, which is a blessing that can never be overstated!




PHILIPPIANS 1:6, NIV

Answer: B (See Matthew 2:1; Luke 2:1-7.)



In his book, First Person Singular, church musician, composer, and professor Carl Schalk relates a story about a phone call he received from a journalist from Birmingham, Alabama. The journalist was writing an article about the "dark side" of Christmas carols. She wished for Pro-

fessor Schalk to comment on the frequent references in many popular Christmas carols to the suffering and crucifixion of Christ. One of the most well-known examples of this which Schalk cited is found in the second stanza of the carol "What Child Is This" (LSB 370)

Nails, spear shall pierce Him through The cross be borne for me, for you.

This stark, even brutal imagery is perhaps more jarring when juxtaposed with the gentle, sweet language of the first stanza with its references to a sleeping Infant, a holy mother, flights of angels filling the night with song, and shepherds who go forth with great joy to share the news of the birth of the Holy Child.

What child is this, who, laid to rest,
On Mary's lap is sleeping?
Whom angels greet with anthems sweet
While shepherds watch are keeping?
This, this is Christ the King,
Whom shepherds guard and angels sing;
Haste, haste to bring Him laud,
The babe, the son of Mary

What is often lost in the telling of the Christmas story is that it is only one part of a much longer, more complex narrative. The Incarnation story which we relate during the Advent and Christmas seasons leads inexorably to the cross and the tomb. Yet even there the story is not over; the Hope of the World who came down to us as a child at Christmas is not left to repose in a borrowed grave. We know this and we recall it each time we gather for worship, but it bears repeating: our Lord lives again having broken the power of death. Charles Wesley's Easter hymn "Christ the Lord is Risen Today" speaks to this reality and reminds us that just as we are buried with Christ, so too shall we rise like Christ:

Made like Him, like Him we rise, Alleluia! Ours the cross, the grave, the skies, Alleluia!

We do well to remember that the cradle which we so often sing about in the hymns and carols of Advent and Christmas always exists in the shadow of the cross. Carl Schalk writes, "the Incarnation and Christ's suffering and death are of one piece, part of the same story! You can't have one without the other. The tradition of carols both remembers and reminds us of this simple fact: "Christ came to die." This fact continues beyond the seasons of

Advent and Christmas and into the visit of the Magi at the Epiphany. Schalk shares a stanza of a haunting carol by Bruce Blunt which captures this truth in a most startling fashion.

When He is King they will clothe Him in grave sheets,
Myrrh for embalming, and wood for a crown,
He that lies now in the white arms of Mary,
Sleeping so lightly on Bethlehem Down.

A particularly exquisite example of the way in which the language of carols seeks to connect the cradle and the cross may be seen in the lovely Basque carol "Sing Lullaby." The hushed whispers of a new mother singing her infant Son to sleep are contrasted with forward-looking references to the redemptive work of Christ's Passion and Resurrection.

Sing lullaby! Lullaby baby, now reclining,
Sing lullaby! Hush, do not wake the Infant King.
Angels are watching, stars are shining
over the place where he is lying.
Sing lullaby!

Sing lullaby! Lullaby baby, now a-sleeping, Sing lullaby! Hush, do not wake the Infant King. Soon will come sorrow with the morning, Soon will come bitter grief and weeping: Sing lullaby!

Sing lullaby! Lullaby baby, now a-dozing, Sing lullaby! Hush, do not wake the Infant King. Soon comes the cross, the nails, the piercing, Then in the grave at last reposing: Sing lullaby!

Sing lullaby! Lullaby! is the babe a-waking?
Sing lullaby! Hush, do not stir the Infant King.
Dreaming of Easter, gladsome morning,
Conquering Death, its bondage breaking: Sing lullaby!

As we journey through these holy, hopeful, watchful, joy-filled seasons together, I would like to leave you with this rather marvelous Benediction from Ray Pritchard's *Why He Came:*

"May you be filled with the wonder of Mary, the obedience of Joseph, the joy of the angels, the eagerness of the shepherds, the determination of the Magi, and the peace of the Christ Child. May the Almighty God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit bless you now

and forever. Amen."

Our Sunday School offerings for October, November, and December are designated to Camp Lutherhoma. Our LCMS Oklahoma District camp and retreat center



is well-known to many of you. Your children, grandchildren, and their friends have attended summer camp, Journey in January, Fruitful in February, Fall Force Camp and other events. Adults have attended retreats, family reunions, and invested time and money in upkeep of the camp.

The original camp was purchased in 1930 during the Great Depression and the current location in 1950. Camp and the outdoor ministry opportunities it affords are in a hard financial situation now. The income from retreats and summer camp has dropped by almost half of what was budgeted for. This is due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Currently income is down \$88,000 from last year.

God has blessed us with a fantastic camp and staff where people, especially youth, can gather together to hear and learn God's Word in the beauty of His Creation. Please give generously.

STUDENT LOAN REPAYMENT FUND

Pursuing a career in service to the Lord through the church is a fulfilling opportunity, but it is not an inexpensive choice. Those who pursue professional church work many times incur educational debt, just like anyone else may do. Repayment of educational debt is often made more difficult by the more modest sala-




ries of church workers, compared to other professions.

In order to encourage and retain our professional church workers here at Christ the Redeemer, several years ago the congregation established a fund to assist our Pastors, DCEs and other synodically-trained church workers in repaying their student loans. I personally am so thankful for all the support and encouragement you give me as I try to do my small part in leading this congregation thru these challenging times.


