What is your favorite "thanksgiving" verse in the Bible? Mine would have to be Luke 23:42, "And he said, 'Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." With these words, the thief on the cross has his heart changed. This expression is the deepest form of thanksgiving that I can think of. The man on the cross with Jesus is guilty, and deserves the death he is about to undergo. As he reflects on his life, hanging there on the cross dying, he sees his own sin. He sees all the people he has hurt by his life of lying, cheating, stealing and even murder. Then, the Word made flesh enters his life. Jesus is there, in the flesh, in a real presence that cannot be denied, and the thief on the cross is saved; saved from his own sin; saved from the power of the devil, and even saved from the death that is moments away. Jesus says to him, "I tell you the truth, today you will be with me in Paradise."

Thank you, Lord! We do not even need to ask what we are thankful for. Thanksgiving is the natural response to this kind of grace and mercy. Thanksgiving is automatic when we, like the thief on the cross, look at our lives and see that we do not deserve anything from God, but then to see Him, God incarnate, on the cross, suffering and dying for us; this produces in us a life lived in thanksgiving. So, this year, do not force thankfulness, but let the truth (Jesus Christ) create in you a life that is by definition thankful. May the presence of Jesus; the same presence that the thief on the cross experienced, keep you firm in the one true faith, and create in you a thankful life. Amen!

Growing Through Gratitude

Thankfulness, studies show, has multiple physical, mental and emotional benefits. Psychologist Robert Emmons calls gratitude "fertilizer




for the mind" because of its powerful effects.


He admits gratitude isn't always easy - especially when life throws us curveballs (see the year 2020) - but says it can be most helpful during and after difficulties. Emmons suggest reframing challenges using thankfulness-based language. Ask, for example: Though I wasn't grateful for the experience at the time, how can I be now? What lessons did I learn, and how did I grow as a person?

Throughout his letters, the apostle Paul reframes his extensive sufferings and urges us to do the same. "Give thanks in all circumstances," he writes, "for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus" (1 Thessalonians 5:18, NIV).





Autumn is a beautiful time of the year in Missouri. The trees are changing color and the first few cool days have urged us

to switch the clothes in the closet and dressers from shorts to sweaters. Debra and I broke down and bought a firepit for our back patio. The smell of the campfire and the taste of smores and cider remind me of days gone by when I was a camp director. Unfortunately, the COVID protocols in place do not allow us to congregate around a fire at this time but perhaps soon we will be able to sit around a fire with friends. Hopefully, you are all able to gather with friends and share their warmth.

The semester is almost halfway done. It is hard to believe. Time zips past me as there are few breaks from classes, homework, papers, and field work. At our fieldwork church, we serve in different capacities based on the church needs. Sometimes we assist with the service or perform some other duties. Faith Lutheran in Oakville is where I have been assigned for fieldwork. We have been worshipping in person, but all other programming has been put on hold. Last Sunday, we had one worship service in the parking lot. God provided great weather. Faith is a completely contemporary congregation and has a unique format for education and programming. Actually, I am blessed to have two fieldwork congregations. The second one is designed as a cross-cultural experience. Chai v' Shalom http://www.chaivshalom.com/ ChaivShalom/Welcome.html is a Lutheran Jewish congregation located near the seminary. Rev. Kevin Parviz is a Jewish convert to the Missouri Synod and runs a storefront church. We seminarians have been learning about reaching out to God's original chosen people utilizing only the Old Testament scriptures. They have some extreme challenges during times when life is normal. These days they are only allowed to have 11 people in the building at one time! I learned that Jewish converts to Christianity will many times be rejected by their families who hold a funeral for the convert to demonstrate that they are dead to their family and community. We continue to pray that the Spirit open their eyes and hearts as Jesus did for his disciples on the road to Emmaus.

Obviously, the best aspect of Fall is that we take time to give thanks to God from whom all blessings flow! I don't have space to list all of the blessings we have in this life. We would like to highlight these prayers of thanksgiving. Deb and I appreciate your support for my work at the seminary. We are so blessed! Thank you! We also thank God that our son, Steven, returned safely to the States as his deployment for the Air Force finished up recently. We thank God for congregations all over the world who, although they may be struggling at this time, spread the Gos-

pel of Jesus Christ. We pray that unrestricted face-to-face fellowship be allowed again soon.

We have several items that we would appreciate you lifting up on our behalf. Our daughter-in-law, Tatiana, is in the Army National Guard and has orders deploying to the Middle East in the coming month. She will be gone for the better part of a year. Her husband, William, who is in the Army, recently finished desert training in preparation for deployment and will probably be sent to a foreign land (yet to be determined) in February.



One of the great joys of my calling as a church musician is that I am constantly afforded the opportunity to discover new music. Some of that music is in fact quite ancient and is only new insofar as it is new to me. Other times it is a collection of newly-composed

music which I find speaks to me. Recently just such a set of pieces was brought to my attention. ... Still All My Song Shall Be: A Collection of Heartsongs is a set of vocal solos written by composer and church musician Tom Trenney. The collection comprises new settings of well-known hymns such as "Be Thou My Vision" and "Great is Thy Faithfulness," settings of more recently composed hymns including "For Everyone Born," and newly-composed pieces including "Like Him We Rise" and "Maya's Prayer for Peace," a musical setting of a prayer by the American poet Maya Angelou.

The past several months have required church workers around the world to approach the way that we do ministry with a degree of creativity and flexibility. The pieces found in ...Still All My Song Shall Be originated in just such circumstances during this time of pandemic as the composer found that he needed new music for soloists to present each week in his congregation's online worship services. The following excerpt from Tom Trenney's Preface to the collection gives context to the origins of the work and captures something of the numerous emotions that many of us have likely felt at various points for a variety of reasons during these past months:

When I came home from choir rehearsal on March 11, 2020, I never could have imagined it would be the last time I'd be making music with our choir for the season...All our plans for music ministry and worship were undone. At first, I could not imagine how I could do what I was so sure God had called me to do. I was lost in a deep sea of disappointment, amidst the waves of cancellations, distressed by the suffering that so many were suddenly facing. But, in a moment of grace, God tapped me on the shoulder and encour-

aged me to stop thinking about all the things I could not do, and instead, to think about the unique ways that I could serve in this peculiar moment that might especially speak to the heart of those I longed to serve...This collection of heartsongs came together week by week...and I pray that they will bring you and your congregation an extra measure of hope and peace as we all find our way in this new wilderness.

Two pieces from this collection have had a particularly strong impact on my spiritual journey recently. I have found myself singing them quietly during moments to myself and have been drawn to play them each time I am seated at the piano to practice. "Like Him We Rise" draws textual inspiration from passages of Scripture, from the Cameroon hymn "He Came Down," as well as a line from Charles Wesley's great Christmas hymn "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing." The refrain, in particular, speaks to the hope of the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come that is ours through the redeeming work of Jesus Christ:

Made like him, like him we rise! Ours the cross, the grave, the skies;

Light and life to all he brings, risen with healing in his wings.

The refrain of "For Everyone Born" draws upon the language of Micah 6:8 which tells us that the Lord requires us to "do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with God."

And God will delight when we are creators of justice and joy, compassion, and peace.

May we always strive to be instruments of God's compassion and peace in a world that is so desperately in need of both. During the coming months, we will hear several of these heartsongs in worship at CTR and I hope that you all will find them to be a blessing on the journey.

Rev. Dale and Suzanne Kaster are missionaries in the Czech Republic. Most recently, they traveled to the town of Varsdorf looking for a place to plant a Gospel outreach. Sunday School Offerings Fourth Quarter



Our Sunday School offerings for October, November, and December are designated to Camp Lutherhoma. Our LCMS Oklahoma District camp and Offering retreat center is well-known to many of you. Your children, grandchildren,

and their friends have attended summer camp, Journey in January, Fruitful in February, Fall Force Camp and other events. Adults have attended retreats, family reunions, and invested time and money in upkeep of the camp.

The original camp was purchased in 1930 during the Great Depression and the current location in 1950. Camp and the outdoor ministry opportunities it affords are in a hard financial situation now. The income from retreats and summer camp has dropped by almost half of what was budgeted for. This is due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Currently income is down \$88,000 from last year.

God has blessed us with a fantastic camp and staff where people, especially youth, can gather together to hear and learn God's Word in the beauty of His Creation. Please give generously.
