

A Letter From The DCE

Fellow Redeemed,

In mid-July I had the pleasure of attending the National Lutheran Youth Workers Conference. Not only that, but two of our youth were a part of the Youth Lead training hosted by synod to help cultivate and prepare them as Christian leaders.

At this year's conference there was a fair amount of time given to understanding Generation Z, those born in the mid-1990'smid-2010's who are currently our 10-25 year olds. Many in this age group make up our 345 youth as well as junior high, high school and college students. You may know many of them as your children or grandchildren. Why is this age group so important? Research studies done by synodical youth ministry, Barna and Lutheran Hour

Ministries all point toward this generation being vastly different than any before. How so?

- This group is considered "digital natives." They have never known a time without digital media.

 This generation's priorities are different. They value finishing their education and having a career as well as being financially independent over starting a family.

- Their attention span is generally 6 seconds (down from 12 seconds the generation before.)

- They live in fear. Their entire life has known nothing other than mass shootings, school shootings and active shooter plans.

- They are authentic. This group will speak their mind and are the most open in their opinions.

- Mental health issues have skyrocketed in 2020 data vs. 2019 due to COVID. In ages 13-18 claims went up by 103%, self harm reports by 90% and overdoses by 119%.

So what can we do at the church to minister to these young people?

- 1. Listen, don't judge. Be understanding, compassionate and open-minded when talking to them even if you believe differently than them.
- 2. Form relationships that are genuine. They are hurt when they feel talked down to. This generation is by far the most welleducated for their age due to the accessibility of information.
- 3. Give hope and guidance. Help build resiliency by sharing open conversation, encouraging them to have an active role in planning and preparing for the future of ministry.
- 4. Give them a voice. They want to be a part of the church including leading, participation in financial process decisions and calls.
- 5. Focus on joy! No matter what tragedies happen in our world and how bad things may seem, Christ has still risen!

With God's Love More LWML Convention Highlights from Lexington

The Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) welcomed 2,787 people to the **LWML Convention** in Lexington, Kentucky, June 24-27, 2021, under the theme "Running the Race ... Looking to Jesus." The convention theme was based on Hebrews 12:1-2. Hosting LWML Districts were Michigan, Indiana, and Ohio. Attending from Christ the Redeemer were Rev. Virgil and Carolyn Benning and Bill and Patti Ross. The voting body adopted a **mission goal** of \$2,150,000 for the 2021-2023 biennium which will fund 28 mission grants. By the grace of God this goal will be met by women and men responding in prayer, contributions, and Mite Box offerings during the next two years.

New board members elected were: Vice President of Christian Life, Susan Brunkow, Kansas District (former LWML Oklahoma District President); VP Communication, Kathy Pavelock, Eastern District; VP Gospel Outreach, Karen Morrison, Kansas District; Recording Secretary, Brenda Piester, Kansas District; and Pastoral Counselor, Rev. Gary Piepkorn, Rocky Mountain District.

Offerings were collected during the convention and included the following recipients. Recipients are chosen by the BOD and Presidents Assembly prior to convention. (Totals are preliminary amounts):

For the 2021-2023 Mission Goal: \$43,494.15

King's Community Outreach in Ft. Wayne, Indiana: \$27,434.02 Gifts for All God's Children's Connecting Kids to Christ Center, Detroit, Michigan: \$28,206.66

POBLO International Ministries in Clinton Township, Michigan: \$27,079.61

The Tee Up 4 Mites Golf Outing was sponsored by the Lutheran Federal Credit Union. Sixty-nine golfers made up 18 teams in the scramble-format, Wednesday morning event. Players competed on the Wildcat Course at the University Club of Kentucky. Past President Linda Reiser and husband Ron, and Past President Patti Ross and husband Bill led off the event which raised \$23,046 for the mission goal.

"The Psalms are the story of our lives and all of life with all the horror and wonder of this story in light of the story of God's love, breaking out in praise, prayer, and proclamation with the gift of music."¹

In our worship lives together, we are constantly singing the story of salvation. Lutheran worship is positively saturated with song. As a family of believers, we are gathered together with song, hear and proclaim the Word with song, approach the Table of the Lord with song, and are sent forth into the world with song. Martin Luther wrote of the Psalms, "Anyone who could not read the whole Bible would here have anyway almost an entire summary of it, comprised in one little book." ² As we consider the songs we raise when we are gathered together to offer prayer and praise to God, we may find that the book of Psalms captures the inherently musical nature of liturgical worship more naturally and more fully than any other part of Scripture.

The Old Testament book of Psalms is a collection of 150 sacred Hebrew songs or hymns, which was likely compiled into its present form following the period of the Babylonian captivity.³ It is probable that the Psalms were first redacted into a single collection during the period of the Second Temple (516 BC-70 AD), when the Psalms would likely have been part of the liturgical practices of both the Temple and local synagogues. The exact provenance of many of the Psalms is a matter of some dispute, although 73 of the Psalms are attributed to King David. The composition of the majority of the Psalms spans a period of at least five centuries, likely beginning in the 9th century BC and continuing into the 5th century BC.

The Psalms are principally a form of religious verse addressed to God, often structured as prayers or set in hymnic forms. While the book of Psalms may certainly be treated as an anthology of prayers and hymns for individual use, many of the Psalms find their most characteristic voice within a liturgical context, that is, when sung or chanted by an assembly of believers. The thematic scope of the Psalms is wide-ranging and varied. The Psalms are not always songs of rapturous praise. There is also, as the Psalmists knew, a time and place, and indeed, a deeply felt need for songs which speak to our human brokenness and frailty. "The Psalms," wrote theologian Walter Brueggemann, "explore the full gamut of human experience from rage to hope." ⁴ The words of the Psalmists capture and give voice to experiences and emotions which are common to all people at one time or another. It is precisely this depth and diversity of feeling that lends the Psalms a durability and emotional resonance which extends far beyond the times and places in which they were composed.

In the coming months, we will delve deeper into the Psalms, learning about the diverse Psalm forms, examining their poetic characteristics, and exploring the varied musical settings which are used to give voice to the words of the Psalmists. It is my hope that you will find that this in-depth look at the Psalter will allow you the opportunity to read and understand familiar passages of Scripture in new ways. May the words of the Psalms help encourage and strengthen you for the journey.

I will bless the LORD at all times; his praise shall continually be in my mouth. (Psalm 34:1)

In these supposed post-pandemic days, I hear the phrase "new normal" way too often for my liking. I am sitting outside on my back patio writing this note. "Well then, we will do what they do in Germany."Although we knew the answer, ritual demanded that we had to ask, "What is that Grandpa?" "We will let it rain."

I enjoy my delusion of control over the happenings in the world. I can wring my hands and make a lot of plans, but in the end, I can not control much, if anything. In my life I experience anxiety over health issues, family issues, money issues, etc.I have more issues than National Geographic. (Ask someone over 50 what that means if you don't get the reference.) Anxiety many times comes from asking "What if..." about things I have no control, like the rain.



This is the promise that you and I have in Phil. 4:5b-7.

5b The Lord is near. 6 Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. 7 And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. 2

We can't understand the will of God or the peace that He provides us. The Hebrew greeting "Shalom" reflects the well- being provided by God despite our circumstances. How do we get Shalom? Talking to God. I am learning to take my concerns to God in prayer instead of being anxious. I want it to become my "new normal"?

As far as Seminary life is going, as of this writing I am in the midst of Summer Hebrew and helping new Seminarians get acclimated to their "new normal". Deb and the boys are doing well. Lord willing, we will be able to visit Tulsa this August between the end of Hebrew and the start of Fall Semester. We appreciate your support and notes of encouragement we receive.



What is the theme for the 2022 LCMS Youth Gathering?

The theme for the 2022 LCMS Youth Gathering is "In All Things" and is centered around Colossians 1:15-20.

When and Where is the 2022 LCMS Youth Gathering?

The next LCMS Youth Gathering will be July 9-13, 2022 in Houston, TX.

What Are the Age Requirements for Participants?

The LCMS Youth Gathering's primary focus is for youth participants between the ages of 14 to 19. To register for the 2022 Gathering, youth participants must meet ONE of the two following eligibility requirements: – Must be 14 years old at the time of the Gathering OR

- Entering his or her ninth-grade year at the time of the Gathering.

While we do allow students from the ages of 14 to 20 to attend, please keep in mind that some of the program content may not be relevant to the youngest and older youth participants as it is geared to high school students.

How Much Does it Cost?

The Gathering registration fee is <u>\$395 per participant</u>. This fee covers all Gathering program and Office of National Mission Youth Ministry administrative costs and secondary insurance for all participants. Hotel, travel and meal costs are not included in the registration fee.

As in the past, CTR asks youth who want to attend to pay the registration fee, which is generally 1/3 of the total cost. The cost of travel, meals, hotel, District activities, t-shirts etc. will all be supported by fundraising and donations.

Faith Stepping Stones

Long before and long after children and youth are part of the church's various ministries they are connected to their families. By far the most influential people in a young person's spiritual life are his or her parents. In fact, scripture itself mandates that a parent's most important calling is to impress upon their children the word of God:

4 Hear, O Israel: The LORD our God, the LORD is one. 5 Love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. 6 These commandments that I give you today are to be upon your hearts. 7 Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up. 8 Tie them as symbols on your hands and bind them on your foreheads. 9 Write them on the doorframes of your houses and on your gates. (Deuteronomy 6)

This scripture is at the cornerstone of our Christian Education ministry. The Church plays a vital role in the spiritual formation of believers and can act as an extended family to all who enter. This can help to show them that their "family" extends beyond their own biological family into the family of Christ represented by the congregation. The union of home and congregation forms a partnership for ministry to take place. The relationship between those who gather publicly for worship and those who interact on a daily basis in homes and communities should be a partnership to carry faith beyond the walls of the church and into each Christian's daily life. The responsibility of the church worker and the church is to strengthen families so that they are able to impress the Word of God into the hearts and minds of their children. The job of the Church is to keep the priority of the family at the forefront of our mission and to give families the understanding and tools they need to raise their children in the Christian faith.

As children grow we want to educate and train them in the faith when they come to the church, but we also want to give families the resources to continue that development at home. As each child in our church grows, we will put resources in your family's hands to help them learn at home what they are also learning here. On August 15, 2021 we celebrate Christian Education Sunday and will have these resources available to each family for their home library. Please look for your child's name with the appropriate age group and bring your book home. Some resources may span multiple grades or ages so if you brought your book home last year we ask that you do not take a repeat copy this year so others can share in these resources. Please share this book with your child and work with them as they Grow in Christ!


BE A TEACHER!


