Okay, pastors are not the be all of the Church. They, as well as the people whom they serve, are a part of Christ's work to call this broken world to Himself. But, still, Christ gives pastors to His Church so that through them the Church may be strengthened and equipped to do that job. "So Christ himself gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the pastors and teachers, to equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up ..." (Eph. 4:11-12 NIV.)

On October 3, the Czech church among whom we serve, was blessed to receive two brand new pastors. These men had served as deacons—Dominik Žbánek, of the Czech language congregation, and our own Martin Damašek, of the English language congregation—for years, faithful to Christ, faithful to Scripture, and faithful to their people. Now, as pastors, they add two more voices into the wilderness that is Czech "faith" (or faithlessness.)

And we thank God that no grass is growing beneath their feet! On Sunday October 31, they will be holding a joint service in Varnsdorf. This city, near the German border, once had an active Lutheran church in it. But that was a long time ago, before the fall of communism. These brothers will be holding worship there and it is our prayer that many might come to the faith that confesses and rejoices that Jesus is Lord and our Savior.

Where they will be permanently sent as those voices is not yet perfectly clear. For the time being, Pastor Dominik will continue with the Prague Czech congregation; and Pastor Martin will continue to work with Dale at the Prague English congregation. Please pray for opened doors and opened hearts.



MUSIC MINISTRY

CHOIR & HANDBELLS FOR YOUTH & ADULTS BY JACOB DRENGLER

By the rivers of Babylon we sat down and wept when we remembered Zion. (Psalm 137:1)

Christians are a people of song. Each week we are gathered together in the name of the Triune God with song, hear and proclaim the Word forth into the world to be God's hands and feet with song.

These songs are not always songs of rapturous praise. There is also, as we see clearly in the book of Psalms, a place, and indeed, a deeply felt need for songs which speak to our human brokenness. As Paul Westermeyer writes, "In the Psalms we deal with the height and depth of human life, articulated in a most compelling way. We see our O Israel, hope in the Lord! For with the Lord there is steadfast love, struggles against the backdrop of God's goodness and mercy- our struggles with God and God's struggles with us in steadfast love and faithfulness."

We do not only sing songs of joy, for we know only too well the weight of sin, death, depression, grief, and injustice. The Psalmist knew all of these things, too. More than that, he understood the need to give voice to the feelings of lamentation and sorrow which arise out of humanity's common experience of these painful realities. Indeed, Psalms of lament, both communal and individual, comprise the single largest category within the Psalter. Consider these words from the Psalms:

Give ear to my words, O Lord; consider my groaning. (Psalm 5:1)

How long, O Lord? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me? (Psalm 13:1)

My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from saving me, so far from my cries of anguish? (Psalm 22:1)

Out of the depths I cry to you, O Lord! O Lord, hear my voice! Let your ears be attentive to the voice of my pleas for mercy! (Psalm 130:1-2)

There are times in our lives when we, like the Psalmist, cry out to God in distress. There may be moments when we join the Psalmist in asking, "How long, O Lord?" Consider those things that rend your own heart; those things which would seek to silence the song of prayer and praise within you. Now consider these words from the Psalmist, taken from the same Psalms quoted above:

But let all who take refuge in you rejoice; let them ever sing for joy, and spread your protection over them that those who love your name may exult in you. (Psalm 5:11)

You who fear the Lord, praise him! [...] For he has not despised or scorned the suffering of the afflicted one; he has not hidden his face from him but has listened to his cry for help. (Psalm 22:22-24)

and with him is plentiful redemption. (Psalm 130:7)

The words of the Psalms of lament arose from a variety of circumstances: sickness, imminent death, persecution, exile, shame, and abuse.² Yet in spite of this, as we see in the above Psalm verses. the Psalmist continued to hope in the Lord for deliverance. As dearly loved children of God, we too share in that hope. This hope gives us reason to sing to the Lord whatever the circumstances, for we know that we do not sing alone. To be sure, we gather and sing together as a family of believers at Christ the Redeemer Lutheran Church. But more than that, we, grafted into Christ through Baptism, are members of the Church of all times and places, a universal body that joins in song with angels, archangels, and all the company of heaven.

Trusting then in the steadfast mercy and love of the God who hears you in your songs of praise and your songs of lament, may you be strengthened for the journey, remembering that you are a child of God who is loved, called, redeemed, and never, ever alone.

I plan on getting out front of some of the work, since I know what it is ahead of time. I also have Systematics I where we are learning how the Bible interprets us and what it says about the human condition. Worship and the Word explains how and why we do the things that we do in worship. The origin of the liturgies and the hymns makes for interesting study. Some of the most hope filled hymns were written under gut wrenching circumstances.

I enjoy all of my classes and I learn a lot in them, but the one that I am intrigued by the most at this time is The History of Lutherans in America. We started in the colonial era and have just arrived at the founding of the LCMS and the St. Louis


