Sing to the LORD a new song; Sing to the Lord, all the earth. Sing to the LORD, praise his name; Proclaim his salvation day after day. (Psalm 96:1-2)

Throughout the centuries, the book of Psalms has served as a wellspring of song from which priests, poets, and composers have drawn, bringing forth text and tunes that have shaped the faith of believers and given voice to their praise and prayers. So influential have the Psalms been on the development of Christian worship and music that Lutheran pastor and church musician Paul Westermeyer refers to the Psalter as the "womb of church music."¹ Our prayer, praise, lament, and thanksgiving may certainly be spoken, but so often they cry out to be sung. We find a vehicle for the expression of that song in the Psalms.

The Psalter contains a richly varied treasury of words that speak to every aspect of the human experience. Here we encounter hymns of praise and thanksgiving, prayers of complaint and lament, cries for deliverance, expressions of a yearning for justice and hope in a God who will execute that justice, and didactic writings that seek to convey some measure of instruction in the faith and the way in which the faithful are called to live.

This month we will consider those psalms which take the form of hymns of praise and thanksgiving. The structure of these psalms may vary, but there are certain common elements that recur through many psalms of this type. Most begin with an invitation to praise God, followed by the recounting of a specific reason that we are to praise God. Psalms of praise often end with a repetition of the invitation found at the beginning or with a doxology. The language of these psalms is most often communal, and so they are particularly well-suited to liturgical use. Notable examples of this psalm type include Psalms 8, 29, 33, 46, 84, 96, 98, and 145-150.

While an exhaustive examination of each individual psalm of praise is beyond the scope of this article, we will now briefly examine Psalm 150 as a representative example of this psalm type.

Let everything that has breath praise the Lord! Praise the Lord! (Psalm 150:6)

In the above excerpt from Psalm 150, all things that are filled with the creative, enlivening breath of God are exhorted to offer praise to the One who breathed them into life. We understand then that we, as living, breathing members of that creation which God looked upon and called good, are called upon to offer fitting praise. For what are we to praise God? How are we to manifest that praise? Perhaps a look at the rest of Psalm 150 will offer some clues.

¹ Praise the LORD! Praise God in his Sanctuary; praise him in his mighty heavens!

- ² Praise him for his mighty deeds; praise him according to his excellent greatness!
- ^a Praise him with trumpet sound; praise him with lute and harp!
 ⁴ Praise him with tambourine and dance; praise him with strings and pipe!
- ⁵ Praise him with sounding cymbals; praise him with loud clashing cymbals! (Psalm 150:1-5)

Following the opening exhortation to praise the Lord, we read in the second verse that we are to praise God for His mighty deeds. What are these mighty deeds? As Christians, we naturally read and understand the Psalms through the lens of a Christological interpretation. God's promised plan of salvation has been accomplished through the redemptive, all-availing sacrifice and glorious resurrection of Christ Jesus. In the cleansing flood of Holy Baptism, we are united with Jesus in his death and resurrection and, by the grace of God, are made partakers in the sure and certain hope of eternal life. These are indeed mighty deeds, worthy of all thanks and praise.

How then are we to praise God? Certainly we are to live lives of love toward God and service to our neighbors. In that way, our lives may be an offering of praise. But how ought we to express that praise as a community of believers gathered around Word, font, and table? The Psalms make it very clear that one way we should do so is through music. Trumpet, lute, harp, tambourine, strings, pipe, cymbals, breath: all are enjoined to be sounded in praise.

It is my hope that as we are gathered together to praise the Triune God, the words of the Psalmists may encourage all of us to join together to "sing to the Lord a new song." Soli Deo Gloria!

For some reason, even though it is raining, I don't have the same feeling towards a thunderstorm. Too scary!

One of my assignments is to read Exodus from start to finish in one sitting multiple times this week. One of the subplots to the story is how God chooses to reveal himself to Moses and the Israelites. In Chapter 19 we read about God revealing himself to the Israelites on Mt. Sinai. Starting in v. 16 God shows up in "thunders and lightning and a thick cloud on the mountain and a very loud trumpet blast, so that all the people in the camp trembled.Then Moses brought the people out of the camp to meet God," That had to be frightening! Too scary! Many times, God identifies Himself by what He has done (I AM the God that created/ brought out of Egypt/redeemed you/ etc.) and at other times He identifies Himself through His traits. When we pick up the story in chapter 34 God is going to tell Moses his name and pass before him. In vs 6 we read "The LORD passed before him and proclaimed, "The LORD, The LORD, a God merciful and gracious, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness...".

What a great God we have. His power could be a threat to us, instead it is comforting. The God who has power greater than any lightning and thunder, chose to exhibit that power ultimately in His Son, Jesus on a cross.His grace and mercy are what we receive instead of wrath because He is slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness. For all this we thank, praise, serve and obey Him. This is most certainly true!

Blessings to all of the Christ the Redeemer Lutheran Church. As we approach the end of summer the nights have begun to cool. Though a blessing to many of us as a relief from the summer heat, it is a double edged sword to a homeless person. The desire to have cool clothing during the day, yet a need to have warm clothing, blankets, and a sleeping bag at night. This is the continuation of the season cycle for a homeless individual on the Tulsa streets.

Every Friday night and throughout the week the Tulsa Saints tries to provide the basic needs a person will need to survive. Besides the food provided on Friday night to help carry those who come through the line until Sunday (the next day another organization does food service for the homeless), we try to provide basic clothing and toiletries. In addition, when we have them, Bibles and other miscellaneous items such as old suitcases and tents.

Additionally, during the week some members of Tulsa Saints spend time taking individuals to appointments, lunch, dinner, biblical studies, and sometimes just a cup of coffee to chat and see how their week is going. I have seen real friendships develop with individuals who have come out of homelessness and continue to get together in fellowship.

There are many believers in Messiah on the streets but lost to the world. **1 John 2:16** For all that is in the world—the desires of the flesh and the desires of the eyes and pride in possessions—is not from the Father but is from the world. Many have fallen to just these things, just as all of us are subject to as well. Our only hope is the salvation of Jesus, who sacrificed himself on the cross for us and them. **Titus 2:11-12** For the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation for all people, training us to renounce ungodliness and worldly passions, and to live self-controlled, upright, and godly lives in the present age.



Even as I write this, I see hope, the grace of God as he has provided a means to help those on the streets and provide them with not only physical needs (Hebrews 13:5), but fellowship with some special people like Chuck, Eric, Dawn, David, Clifford, Dave, Cory, and many, many others.

I want to make a plea to our congregation. As we approach winter I would ask everyone to include the homeless in their prayers each day and if you have some extra coats, sweat shirts, jeans, and other items for to coming cooler weather, please begin bringing to the church for donation to the Tulsa Saints so we can distribute it to those on the



streets. God Bless and the Love of Messiah Jesus Christ be with you always.

As always, if you wish to come out and help we meet at Fridays 5:15 on 4th Street between Denver and Cheyenne in front of the Metro Bus Station (near the BOK). We hand out food and supplies until we run out.



We continue to have our regular meetings on the third Tuesday of the month at 12:30, October 19 will be our next meeting. Look for us in the fellowship hall or one of the classrooms. Please use the ECC entrance or the east entrance.

October 5 we will be loading the truck to take our LWR items to OKC. As of this writing, we have 4 boxes of fabric kits, 8 boxes of health kits, 43 boxes of school kits, and 19 boxes of quilts. Thank you to everyone that helped with this mission.

Oklahoma District Fall Retreat is November 5-6, in Hinton Oklahoma at the Canyon Camp and Conference Center. Please let me know if you are interested in attending. God's Quilt of Comfort is the theme this year.

This year we are going to try to have a Christmas party in December. I will let you know more details as we make our plans.

QUILTS


What brings warmth and shelter to families by becoming a bed, room divider, backpack, and at times even a home???



Now Thank We All Our God By Rev. Tiews



Did you start off your day annoyed...because you ran out of coffee filters, or because your Internet connection isn't as fast as you'd like? Are you letting "gnats" like these overshadow your gratitude for the rich gifts of God-a comfortable place to live, the ability to come and go as you please, the privilege of being able to receive the Lord's gifts of Word and Sacrament every single week? My Latvian colleague at Riga Luther Academy and I have spent the last several days interviewing over Zoom men and women from around the world who are applying to the Bachelor of Theology program beginning this fall. We spoke at length with applicants from Turkey, Italy, Rumania, Pakistan, and even California. But the most gripping interview we conducted—which exhibited one man's extreme thankfulness for our Lord and Savior and unswerving trust in His guidance and care—was with a South Sudanese man. "James" (not his real name) is a Lutheran pastor. Some of his favorite passages are Genesis 3:15, the first Gospel proclamation in the Bible (remember Ilya a few weeks ago?); also, God's sparing the Israelites from the death of their firstborn by the blood of lambs in Exodus 12-and the fulfillment of that prophecy in the blood of the true Lamb of God in the Last Supper and on the cross of Calvary, which spares us from eternal death. Surely, if James wishes to enroll in this four-year program, he must live in a nice home with high-speed Internet access. No, not guite... You see, James, his wife, and five children live in a tent in a refugee camp in Kenya. They were forced to flee their homeland because of ongoing civil war in South Sudan. Even though a pastor for almost fifteen years, James wishes to deepen his understanding of Lutheran Christianity and also improve his English. And so he plans to take all his classes on his cell phone—from the refugee camp—until he and his family can return to their home. That is what I call extreme gratitude for the Lord's gifts—and trust in His unswerving guidance. "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly...with thankfulness in your hearts to God" (Col 3:16).
