Last month I asked a series of leading questions regarding the future of CTR. This month I would like to offer some thoughts regarding some of those questions.Last month I asked, "How will we intentionally connect the lost to our church, Christ, and one another?" "intentional connection". Why do you have the relationships that you currently have? Interesting question, isn't it? Reaching Out With Missionary Support

We currently support three LCMS missionaries through LCMS Mission Central with funding from our budget. One missionary we had supported, the Dicke family in Papua, New Guinea, has retired and moved back to the States. In their place, we've been asked to support a new family in the mission field.

Rev. Joel and Deaconess Clarion Fritsche serve the Lord as missionaries in the Dominican Republic. Joel serves as the director of Concordia Seminary and Mercy Center in Palmar Arriba and as a church planter. Clarion serves as a deaconess at Iglesia Lutherana del Pueblo Nuevo, where she directs Sunday school, VBS and women's Bible studies. She also works with the wives of the seminarians preparing them for their new role as pastors' wives.

Joel was born in Houston, received his degree in music from Concordia, Seward and Master of Divinity from Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. Clarion was born in the Republic of Panama and received degrees from Concordia, Mequon and Concordia Seminary, Ft. Wayne. They have three boys.

Please pray that God continues to bless Joel and Clarion's service. We give thanks that they are serving God's children in the Dominican Republic.

We continue with our support of Rev. Christian Tiews and family in Germany and the Eurasia region where he works with immigrants from Iran, Afghanistan, and other Middle Eastern countries. Rev. Tiews was pastor at Grace, Tulsa and Trinity, Okmulgee before entering the mission field.

Our third missionary and our longest supported family is Rev. Dale and Suzanne Kaster who works with the Lutheran Church in the Czech Republic.

Please remember these families in your prayers as we thank God for their service sharing the Word of God.



Lutheran Women in Mission – LWML -- Featured Mission Grants for February

Oklahoma District LWML Mission Grant – This \$12,000 grant is given to Oklahoma District men studying for the ministry at one of our two LCMS seminaries. The money is given directly to the individual students to use as they have need. It is divided between the number of students we have. National LWML Grant – A \$100,000 grant brings an expansion of the broadcast area of "Worship Anew" and their outreach to homebound and aging through media. Fifteen-minute devotions and entire worship services are available over TV, CD's, and online. See what they offer at www.worshipanew.org.



The word alleluia, derived from the Hebrew word halleluyah, means "Praise the Lord." During the penitential season of Lent, the Church has traditionally refrained from singing or speaking alleluia within the context of the liturgy. On Transfiguration Sunday, the Sunday before Ash Wednesday, there has long been a tradition within the western Church of saying "farewell" to alleluia, often through a brief ceremony or the singing of a hymn which prominently features the word alleluia. Alleluia is then joyously restored when Christians gather to celebrate the Feast of the Resurrection at Easter.

The custom of omitting alleluia during Lent goes back to at least the fifth century, while the practice of more formally bidding it farewell originated in the Middle Ages. In his text Mediaeval Hymns and Sequences, eminent English hymnwriter John Mason Neale quotes at length from an early version of the farewell to alleluia found in the Mozarabic Rite, one of the earliest liturgical rites of the western Church:

Alleluia in heaven and in earth; it is perpetuated in heaven, it is sung in earth. There it resounds everlastingly; here sweetly. There happily; here concordantly. There ineffably; here earnestly. There without syllables; here in musical numbers. There from the angels; here from the people. Which, at the birth of Christ the Lord, not only in heaven, but the earth, did the angels sing; while they proclaimed, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men of good will.

Thou shalt go, O Alleluia, Thou shalt have a prosperous journey, O Alleluia. And again with joy thou shalt return to us, O Alleluia. For in their hands they shall bear thee up; lest thou hurt thy foot against a stone. And again with joy thou shalt return to us, O Alleluia.

The hymn with which we at CTR will bid farewell to alleluia this year is Alleluia, Song of Gladness (LSB 417). It is a translation of an ancient Latin hymn likely composed between the years 800 to 1100. In the second stanza, it compares the season of Lent, devoid of alleluia, to the exile of the Israelites during the Babylonian captivity. While this hymn had fallen out of use by the time of the Reformation, it was rediscovered and translated by John Chandler during the nineteenth century, later becoming widely used across a variety of Christian denominations as a farewell to alleluia in anticipation of the season of Lent. The translation found in Lutheran Service Book is a revision of a later translation by the aforementioned Neale.


In the singing of Alleluia, Song of Gladness, we are reminded that on this side of eternity things are not yet as they should be. "Alleluia cannot always be our song while here below," we sing. As we journey through this Lenten season, it is perhaps not such a bad thing to remember that we live in a fallen and broken world; a world that desperately needs to be made whole. Yet this hymn also reminds us that we are Easter people even in the midst of Lenten wilderness: "Therefore in our hymns we pray Thee, grant us, blessed Trinity, at the last to keep Thine Easter with Thy faithful saints on high." Although we refrain from alleluia for a time, we wait in joyful anticipation of the final Resurrection dawn, when we will join again in the song of the saints at the marriage feast of the Lamb in His kingdom which has no end. Here we join in that song for only a little while; there we will join in that song eternally.

As the season of Lent begins, we are reminded that we are dust and that we shall return to dust. While we know this to be true, we face this knowledge with the sure and certain confidence born of the marvelous hope that is ours through the redemptive death and resurrection of Christ.

We go down to the dust; yet even at the grave we make our song: Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia. (The Book of Common Prayer, p. 483)

Seminary News



Greetings from the Seminary!

We are in the home stretch of the Seminary experience. It has gone by so fast! Thank you for all of your support in this endeavor. I couldn't have done it without you!

We should start having interviews with congregations this month. I have been informed by Dr. Nielsen, the guy who determines the placement of vicars and new pastors, that I will be placed in a congregation that is vacant and has been served by a sole Pastor, not a team ministry. There are many congregations in this situation and quite a few that are calling and contacted the Seminary looking for help. Some of them want a young guy with a young family. That is obviously not me, but perhaps there is one that is willing to put my experience to work in their context. The whole process is in God's hands, where it belongs.

The great news that I received today is that I passed my final language competency exam in Hebrew. To some of the guys, the language requirements are a hoop to jump through on the way to graduation. We have a lot of online tools to help people understand the languages. I, however, wanted to be able to pick up the Scriptures in either Greek or Hebrew, and be able to read and comprehend it on at least a basic level. It is not a necessary skill to be a good pastor, I know many excellent Pastors that have forgotten most of the languages. It is an opportunity that I wanted to take full advantage of for my own edification and competency. I thank God for the opportunity and the ability to see it through.


In February our hearts turn to thoughts of love. I remember sending Valentines cards to all of my classmates when I was in grade school, I don't know if kids are allowed to do this anymore. I have been teaching Sunday Morning Bible Class on the book of John. When we got to John 3:16, a verse that is very familiar to most people as the Gospel in a nutshell, it is easy skim over it what it says about love. Much is made of the concept of love in our day. 
BLESSING BAGS

What is a Mite Box and What is Mite Box Sunday

For over 75 years Lutherans have saved their spare change and their offerings for missions in the Lutheran Women in Mission, LWML, Mite Box offerings. Patterned after the story in the book of Mark about the widow's mites which Jesus recognized, people are urged to collect change and offerings in a small box and, with prayer, add their offering to those of others across the U.S. to

fund the grants given to spread the Gospel at home and abroad. Those grants are chosen by delegates at Lutheran Women's Missionary League district and national conventions every two years.

Examples of district grants this biennium include Persis, the comfort dog, a pool cover for Lutherhoma, Braille Ministry Centers in Tulsa and Edmond, scholarships for district students entering the ministry or church work and more. National grants have included grants in Africa, the United States, Mongolia, Russia, Peru, Belize, Ethiopia, and Sierra Leone among others.

At CTR we designate the first Sunday of every month to collect those offerings in the large Mite Box. If you collect change at the drive-thru or empty pockets in the laundry room, think about how that change can help bring about Almighty change! Pick up a Mite Box for your home and car!


What brings warmth and shelter to families by becoming a bed, room divider, backpack, and at times even a home???

(Membership Overview) Here are two CTR outreach projects that need your \$250. One is the quilt sewing mission; see Lynne Kollock for details. Another major CTR mission is Tulsa Saints. CTR members go to the area near Tulsa Bus station late each Friday evening. Once a month three ladies, at their own expense, make sloppy Joes to be distributed to the hungry. 
