Music Notes for April 21, 2024 - Fourth Sunday of Easter

The Prelude for the Fourth Sunday of Easter is a lyrical setting of the Hymn of the Day, "The King of Love My Shepherd Is" (LSB 709), by Anglo-Irish composer Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924). In addition to his own work as a composer, Stanford was renowned as a teacher of composition. During Stanford's four decades as professor of composition at the Royal College of Music in London, his pupils included such luminaries of the British musical firmament as Samuel Coleridge-Taylor, Ralph Vaughan Williams, Gustav Holst, Herbert Howells, and Rebecca Clarke.

The Voluntary is a reflective setting of "The King of Love My Shepherd Is" by American composer and organist Robert Hobby (b. 1962). Mr. Hobby serves as Director of Music at Trinity English Lutheran Church in Fort Wayne, Indiana.

The Sanctuary Choir will sing "O Bread of Life from Heaven" by J.S. Bach (1685-1750) during the distribution of communion. The music is a harmonization of the German chorale O WELT, ICH MUSS DICH LASSEN, excerpted from Bach's *St. Matthew Passion*, while the text is a translation of a 17th-century Latin communion hymn.

The Postlude is a chorale prelude on the German Easter hymn *Christ lag in Todesbanden*, translated in *Lutheran Service Book* as "Christ Jesus Lay in Death's Strong Bands" (LSB 458). This hymn was written by Martin Luther, who modeled it after "Christ is Arisen" (LSB 459), a medieval folk hymn. The setting of this hymn presented today was written by the German composer and organist Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) and is excerpted from the *Orgelbüchlein* (Little Organ Book), a collection of 45 chorale preludes for organ that encompasses the whole of the liturgical year.

This interpretation of the chorale makes use of a full registration consisting of the foundation, reed, and mixture stops of the organ, in keeping with the *Affekt* of the hymn:

Christ Jesus lay in death's strong bands for our offenses given; But now at God's right hand He stands and brings us life from heaven. Therefore let us joyful be and sing to God right thankfully Loud songs of alleluia!
