

First Reading

Acts 8:26-40

A The First Reading for the Fifth Sunday of Easter is from Acts, chapter eight.

²⁶An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Rise and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." This is a desert place. ²⁷And he rose and went. And there was an Ethiopian, a eunuch, a court official of Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, who was in charge of all her treasure. He had come to Jerusalem to worship ²⁸and was returning, seated in his chariot, and he was reading the prophet Isaiah. ²⁹And the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over and join this chariot." ³⁰So Philip ran to him and heard him reading Isaiah the prophet and asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" ³¹And he said, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to come up and sit with him. ³²Now the passage of the Scripture that he was reading was this: "Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter and like a lamb before its shearer is silent, so he opens not his mouth.

³³In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth."

³⁴And the eunuch said to Philip, "About whom, I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" ³⁵Then Philip opened his mouth, and beginning with this Scripture, he told him the good news about Jesus. ³⁶And as they were going along the road they came to some water, and the eunuch said, "See, here is water! What prevents me from being baptized?" ³⁸And he commanded the chariot to stop, and they both went down into the water, Philip and the eunuch, and he baptized him. ³⁹And when they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord carried Philip away, and the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. ⁴⁰But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he passed through, he preached the gospel to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

Epistle

1 John 4:1–21

A The Epistle is from First John, chapter four.

¹Beloved, do not believe every spirit, but test the spirits to see whether they are from God, for many false prophets have gone out into the world. ²By this you know the Spirit of God: every spirit that confesses that Jesus Christ has come in the flesh is from God, ³and every spirit that does not confess Jesus is not from God. This is the spirit of the antichrist, which you heard was coming and now is in the world already. ⁴Little children, you are from God and have overcome them, for he who is in you is greater than he who is in the world. ⁵They are from the world; therefore they speak from the world, and the world listens to them. ⁶We are from God. Whoever knows God listens to us; whoever is not from God does not listen to us. By this we know the Spirit of truth and the spirit of error.


⁷Beloved, let us love one another, for love is from God, and whoever loves has been born of God and knows God. ⁸Anyone who does not love does not know God, because God is love. ⁹In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent his only Son into the world, so that we might live through him. ¹⁰In this is love, not that we have loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the propitiation for our sins. ¹¹Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. ¹²No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us and his love is perfected in us.

¹³By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. ¹⁴And we have seen and testify that the Father has sent his Son to be the Savior of the world. ¹⁵Whoever confesses that Jesus is the Son of God, God abides in him, and he in God. ¹⁶So we have come to know and to believe the love that God has for us. God is love, and whoever abides in love abides in God, and God abides in him. ¹⁷By this is love perfected with us, so that we may have confidence for the day of judgment, because as he is so also are we in this world. ¹⁸There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear. For fear has to do with

punishment, and whoever fears has not been perfected in love. ¹⁹We love because he first loved us. ²⁰If anyone says, "I love God," and hates his brother, he is a liar; for he who does not love his brother whom he has seen cannot love God whom he has not seen. ²¹And this commandment we have from him: whoever loves God must also love his brother.

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Music Notes for April 28, 2024 - Fifth Sunday of Easter

The Prelude and Voluntary for the Fifth Sunday of Easter are excerpted from David Cherwien's (b. 1957) Partita on the Opening Hymn, "Come, You Faithful, Raise the Strain" (LSB 487). The majestic first movement, which will serve as the Prelude, is inspired by the first stanza of the hymn:

Come, you faithful, raise the strain of triumphant gladness! God has brought His Israel into joy from sadness. Loosed from Pharoah's bitter yoke Jacob's sons and daughters, Led them with unmoistened foot through the Red Sea waters.

The fourth movement of Dr. Cherwien's Partita will be heard during the gathering of the tithes and offerings. This movement, which features ethereal harmonies and a gentle registration, is a musical interpretation of the fourth stanza of "Come, You Faithful:"

For today among His own Christ appeared, bestowing His deep peace, which evermore passes human knowing. Neither could the gates of death nor the tomb's dark portal Nor the watchers nor the seal hold Him as a mortal.

The Communion Voluntary is a buoyant setting of the Hymn of the Day, "At the Lamb's High Feast We Sing" (LSB 633), by American composer and organist Charles Ore (b. 1936). Dr. Ore is Emeritus Professor of Music at Concordia University Nebraska and maintains an active career as a church musician as organist of First Presbyterian Church in Lincoln, Nebraska.

The Postlude is a stately fanfare on "At the Lamb's High Feast We Sing" by John Behnke (b. 1953). Subtitled "The Eclipse," this piece is drawn from *Three Church Windows: Reflections for Organ*, a collection of organ pieces inspired by three of the stained glass windows of Peace Lutheran Church in St. Louis, Missouri. This movement was inspired by the window placed in the center of the church, directly above the altar, which is called the "Eclipse Window."

In his preface to *Three Church Windows*, Dr. Behnke reflected on the inspiration that the "Eclipse Window" provided, writing:

To me, even though it is the smallest window, it is the most intense. Out of the black background emerges the blue halo, and inside the lens shines brilliant reds, yellows, and lighter blue colors. It focuses our eyes on the empty cross, and in its placement above the altar points us to victory over death and the grave. This window reminds us that we share in the victory of Christ, which is expressed with the hymn "At the Lamb's High Feast We Sing."
