



Music Notes for May 11, 2025 - Fourth Sunday of Easter

The Prelude, Voluntary, and Postlude for the Fourth Sunday of Easter, also known as Good Shepherd Sunday, were written by German organists living and composing during the Baroque period (roughly 1600-1750). The Prelude and Postlude are drawn from a set of variations on the Opening Hymn, "Jesus Lives! The Victory's Won" (LSB 490), by Johann Gottfried Walther (1684-1748), who was, in addition to his work as an organist, composer, and music theorist, was the author of the *Musicalisches Lexicon* (1732), the first dictionary of musical terms written in the German language. The Voluntary, a lyrical chorale prelude on "Jesus Lives! The Victory's Won," was written by Walther's more famous cousin, Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750), the preeminent German organist and composer of the Baroque period.

During the 10:45 service, the Peace Choir, which comprises CTR students from first through eighth grade, will sing several pieces as part of the liturgy. "Hosanna! Blessed Is He," Carol McClure's (b. 1955) energetic setting of Mark 11:9b, will serve as the Opening Sentences before the singing of the Opening Hymn. "Lamb of God," an expressive musical setting of the *Agnus Dei*, will be sung as the Introit. "The Lord is My Shepherd," a dance-like paraphrase of Psalm 23, the appointed Psalm for the Fourth Sunday of Easter, will be sung by the Peace Choir between the First Reading and Epistle. Finally, the choir will lead the congregation in singing "Easter Affirmation" by Harriet Willoughby (b. 1960) prior to the reading of the Holy Gospel. We are excited for our youngest singers to provide musical leadership in the liturgy this morning!

The Communion Voluntary is a gentle piano arrangement of "I Am Jesus' Little Lamb" (LSB 740) by American composer and church musician Sandra Eithun (b. 1963). A prolific composer for handbells and piano, Ms. Eithun has over 600 compositions in publication.
